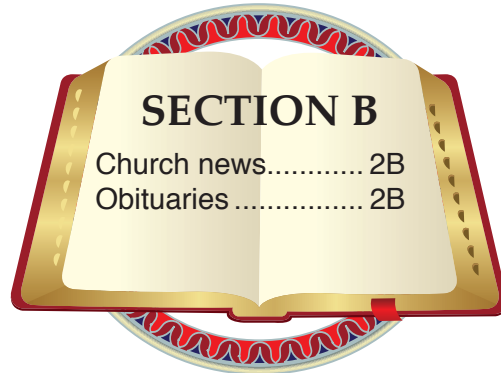

Among the center's most recent fundraisers were its fifth annual golf tournament, and a col-

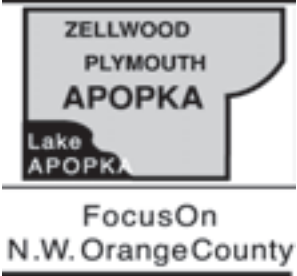
laborative effort with WBZW 1520 to host a radio program featuring businesses, non-profit organizations, and cancer survivors.

DAVE KRONENBERG'S POTATO LATKAS

4 large potatoes
1 medium onion
1 large egg
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon white pepper
1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
vegetable oil (for frying)

Grate potatoes and onion. Transfer to colander and squeeze mixture to press out as much liquid as possible. In a large bowl, mix egg, salt, pepper, flour and baking powder. Add potatoes and onions, and mix well. Heat oil in a deep, heavy skillet. Drop about 2 tablespoons of potato mixture into the pan for each pancake. Flatten with back of spoon so each pancake is about 2-1/2 to 3 inches in diameter. Fry over medium heat for about 4 to 5 minutes on each side or until golden brown and crisp. Turn carefully with two spatulas so oil does not splatter. Drain on paper towels (or brown paper bags are better). Before frying each new batch, stir potato mixture. If all oil is absorbed, add a little more to the pan. Serve hot with applesauce or sour cream or sugar.

Our contributor says he can't imagine Hanukkah without fried potato pancakes (latkas in Yiddish and livivot in Hebrew) and continues, "We eat latkas on Hanukkah to remind us of the oil which miraculously burned for eight days when the Maccabees purified and rededicated the holy Temple in Jerusalem. But latkas are so tasty that they can be eaten the other days of the year, too."

JANELL MAXWELL'S CASHEW CHICKEN

1 package uncooked chicken breasts, deboned and cut into 3/4-inch to 1-inch pieces
3 eggs
2 tablespoons soy sauce
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon salt

Mix together eggs, soy sauce, flour and salt. Stir in chicken pieces. Let sit for 10 minutes. Deep fry until golden brown. Set aside for later.

Sauce:

4 chicken bouillon cubes
1 teaspoon salt
1-1/2 cups water, boiling on stove while dissolving bouillon cubes

1/2 cup cold water with 2-1/2 table- spoons cornstarch

After bouillon cubes are dissolved, add other sauce ingredients. Bring to a boil and add cold water with cornstarch. Let thicken. Place deep fried chicken on plate, pour some sauce over it and top with chopped green onions and cashews. Serve over cooked rice. Serves four.

Personal notes: I find that I can break up the bouillon cubes before adding them to the water to save on time. Also, I omit the salt in the sauce and use a tablespoon or two of additional soy sauce so the sauce is a darker color (my preference). This recipe is easy to double or triple or for serving larger crowds. Another time-saving tip if you are cooking a larger amount of chicken: you can make the chicken the day before and store it in the refrigerator overnight. Next day, spread the chicken out on a cookie sheet and bake in the oven at 425 degrees, stirring occasionally, just long enough to get it hot and crisp it up.

LOUISE USTLER'S FRIED GREEN TOMATOES

1 tablespoon brown sugar
1 cup all-purpose flour
4 to 6 medium green tomatoes, sliced 1/2-inch thick
1 egg, beaten
1/4 cup milk
1 cup seasoned dry bread crumbs
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 tablespoon cooking oil

In a skillet, heat butter and oil over high heat. Combine sugar and flour. Place on a shallow plate. Dip both sides of each tomato slice into the mixture. Combine the egg and milk; dip each tomato slice. Then dip into bread crumbs. Fry tomatoes until brown on both sides but firm enough to hold their shape. Makes 6 servings.

NOTE: Put a little bit of salt into this recipe somewhere along the way, either in the flour mixture or the egg-milk mixture. (Not much salt, just a little.)

BONNIE MILLIKEN'S CRAZY CRUST MEAT PIE

1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 cup shortening
1/2 cup sour cream
1 egg

Stir all ingredients lightly. Spread into greased pie pan. Fill with fillings as desired. Bake 400 degrees for 20-25 minutes.

Filling: variable (your choice)

1 pound ground beef, or ground ham, or ground turkey that has been browned with one medium chopped onion.

Add 6 ounces tomato sauce.

Add 1 or 2 cups Velveeta or other cheese.

Add can of beans or chili or corn, as de-

sired. The crust comes to the top as it is baked.

MARGARITE NOWELL'S BROCCOLI SALAD

1 large bunch broccoli florets
1 cup raisins
1 cup celery
2 cups grapes, cut in half
1 cup almonds, slivered
1 cup sunflower seeds
1 small red onion
3 or 4 slices bacon, cooked, crumbled

Dressing for broccoli salad:
1 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup white sugar
1 teaspoon balsamic vinegar

Mix all salad ingredients together. Put in crumbled bacon. Pour salad dressing in and toss. Refrigerate 24 hours.

DIANE BUNNELL'S CREAM CHEESE POUND CAKE

3 sticks butter
1 8-ounce package cream cheese
3 cups sugar
6 eggs
3 cups cake flour
2 tablespoons vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Cream butter, cream cheese and sugar thoroughly. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each egg. Sift cake flour and add to creamed mixture. Mix well. Add vanilla and mix again. Grease and flour a 9-inch tube baking pan. Pour batter into pan. Bake 300 degrees for 1 to 1-1/2 hours or until done. Allow to cool in pan.

BONNIE MILLIKEN'S PIUTE PUMPKIN

3 cups cooked, mashed pumpkin (fresh or canned)
1 cup apple, peeled and chopped
1/4 cup nuts, pinion, walnuts, pecans, chopped
1/4 cup raisins
1/4 cup honey (or more to taste)
1 teaspoon salt

2 eggs, beaten
3 tablespoons butter
1/2 teaspoon pumpkin pie spices (cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves)

Mix all ingredients except butter in a 1-quart baking dish/casserole. Dot with butter. Bake 350 degrees for 1 hour or so until apples are soft.

LILLIAN CLEGHORN'S YELLOW SQUASH CASSEROLE

6 medium squash, sliced 1/2-inch thick

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1 teaspoon salt

1 cup canned evaporated milk

2 eggs, beaten

1 cup cheese, grated

1 cup onions, chopped

2 cups saltine cracker crumbs (di-

vided)

3/4 stick butter or oleo, melted

Mix squash, pepper, salt and milk in large bowl. Add eggs, cheese, onions and 1 cup of the crumbs. Pour into greased 9 x 13-inch baking dish. Sprinkle another cup of cracker crumbs on top and drizzle with melted butter. Bake at 375 degrees for about 40 minutes. Makes 12 servings.

ROBYN MILLIKEN'S CRUNCH BARS

35 saltine crackers
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 package (8 squares) semi-sweet baking chocolate, chopped
1 cup chopped nuts

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Place crackers in a single layer on foil-lined 15 x 10 x 1-inch baking pan. Heat butter and sugar in saucepan on medium heat until butter is melted and mixture is well blended. Bring to boil; boil 3 minutes without stirring. Spread mixture over crackers. Bake seven minutes. Immediately sprinkle with chopped chocolate. Let stand five minutes. Spread melted chocolate evenly over ingredients in pan. Sprinkle with nuts. Cool. Cut or break into pieces. Makes 16 servings.

JUDY QUIMBY'S WASHING CLOTHES RECIPE

Years ago, an Alabama grandmother gave the new bride the following recipe. This is an exact copy as written and found in an old scrapbook, with spelling errors and all.

WASH'N CLOTHES

Build fire in back yard to heat kettle of rain water.

Set tubs so smoke wont blow in eyes if wind is pert. Shave one hole cake of lie soap in boilin water.

Sort things, make 3 piles:

- 1 pile white,
- 1 pile colored,
- 1 pile work britches and rags.

To make starch, stir flour in cool water to smooth, then thin down with boiling water.

Take white things, rub dirty spots on board, scrub hard, and boil. Then rub colored don't boil just wrench and starch.

Take things out of kettle with broom stick handle, then wrench, and starch. Hang old rags on fence. Spread tea towels on grass. Pore wrench water in flower bed. Scrub porch with hot soapy water. Turn tubs upside down.

Go put on clean dress, smooth hair with hair combs. Brew cup of tea, sit and rock a spell and count your blessings.

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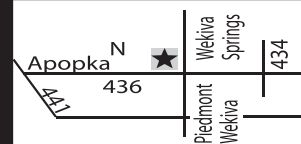
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Newly formed Foundation for OCPS to take effect July 1

Founded in 1987, the Foundation for Orange County Public Schools is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization with a mission to identify, develop and focus community resources to make a meaningful impact on the success of students and teachers of Orange County Public Schools.

The Foundation has

been a direct support organization of Orange County Public Schools and is working to do the following: promote literacy of students through reading; promote quality teaching by increasing opportunities for teachers to participate in high quality professional development; promoting learning support by increasing resources and rewards for teachers who develop innovative and enriching approaches to helping students learn; and promote community engagement with the district.

“We are very excited about this new model for the foundation and the opportunities it will

provide for us to achieve our mission on behalf of the students and teachers of Orange County Public Schools,” said said Ormend Yeilding, current board chair of the Foundation. “This structure will reflect the Foundation’s alignment with the goals of District leadership and the PSP, and we believe this alignment will be highly valued by our donors”

In June 2011, the Philanthropic Development Office was charged with securing the resources needed to implement the district wide initiatives in the OCPS Philanthropic Strategic Plan, also known as the PSP. This comprehensive

plan originally grew out of a collaborative effort between the Foundation for Orange County Public Schools, the school board, and the district.

members.”
Welch is stepping down as chairman this year. Brian Furgala, shareholder for the Orlando law firm Gray Robinson, will succeed him on July 1, the start of the Chamber’s fiscal year.

Furgala later delivered his remarks as the incoming chairman.
