

Girls: Blue Darters were in state tournament for the first time in many years

Blue Darters after being reduced to only eight teams. However, saying Apopka advanced to the final eight isn't justice to describing the transformation from qualifying for the first time in more than 15 seasons to a game equal with the rest of the field.

"I am so proud of the bowlers for all achieved during this post-season," Blue Darters coach Doug Campbell said. "Advancing to the final eight and the quality of bowling increasing to the level of still capable of advancing is quite an achievement."

Utmost and weightiest drama was Apopka's companion while advancing.

"Specifically, though, with multiple tiebreakers (playoff), close as possible scores, we are still competing at the stage of eight team across the entire state," Campbell said. "The team concept was followed despite playing in an atmo-

sphere and environment of so much emotion. Bowling as a team from start to finish ultimately had a huge role in the success."

Headlining the list of drama was winning a playoff with elimination on the line. The ninth and 10th frames are bowled again during a playoff. Facing the Ft. Myers Green Wave in the elimination bracket and down 2 games to 0, Lexey Sapone tallied a spare, followed by a Jordan Walker's turkey (three consecutive strikes). Final score of the playoff was 50-27. The playoff was needed due to a 150-150 tie.

The Blue Darters evened the series with a convincing victory by the score of 196-141.

Then a second playoff was needed to determine the outcome of the fifth game and most importantly, elimination was on the line for both teams. The score was 151-151 after 10 frames. Sapone knocked down a strike. Strike, strike, and nine pins were produced by Walker to provide Apopka with a 59-29 victory and the

means to advance.

No playoffs were needed during the next series against the Seabreeze Sandcrabs. However, the Blue Darters lost the first game by a score of 178-168 and had to come from behind. Next three games ended with scores of 188-178, 182-174, and 167-145 in favor of Apopka. The lead held by the Sandcrabs was 11 points entering the eighth frame. Five consecutive strikes produced the 21-point turnaround. Marks were decided by the slimmest margin at 8-7. At 7-4, Apopka held the advantage in strikes.

Both teams produced eight strikes during the third game. The difference was five of the Blue Darters' marks were consecutive. Maximum for Seabreeze was two.

Five consecutive marks during the fourth game secured the victory.

The Tavares Bulldogs provided the opposition for the first series.

Of the 12 games the Blue Darters competed in, nine were decided by nine points or less.

Percentage of marks compared to total frames rose from 56 to 73 from the playoff ending the third game of the series against Ft. Myers.

The rest of the roster consists of Hunter King, Morgan McCabe, Kenna Hancock and Tykia Graham.

"Qualifying fourth and the consistency in scores to qualify fourth set the tone of using the emotion as a positive, not a negative," Campbell said. "When marks were absolutely needed to get a certain score, we did."

Walker qualified for the individual competition last and this season. By a 2-0 count, Walker won the first series of the 2020 competition. Then the next two series were lost.

Baker rules tournament on November 3. The Blue Darters had to best an average of 208 when facing the Bulldogs during the second round though. The series even concluded with a fifth game and Melbourne's highest score of 245 compared to 199 for Apopka. Strikes were 8-4 in favor of the Bulldogs during the fifth game.

As Thursday continued, Apopka faced having to win five consecutive (best-of-five games) series if a sixth state championship is to be claimed. However, the big picture is the Darters remain a part of the field with only four teams remaining.

"End goal of still competing and remaining alive was achieved," Apopka coach Doug Campbell said. "And we can still win by lowering the open frame percentage to six again. Competing and remaining alive must be achieved before win-

ning the state championship. Nor is still competing and remaining alive at the end of Day 1 easy."

The streak of the Blue Darters advancing to the second day of competition and juncture of the field reduced to eight teams is now eight consecutive seasons.

Other scores making up Melbourne's victory were 198-189, 174-196, 224-206, and 202-269 scores.

"Scores were consistently solid during the 10-pin components, which positioned us in the lead," Doug Campbell said. "Securing victories during the tournament was a different story. Or the securing part wasn't as strong as could be."

"Two victories were secured with scores in the 190s and 200s. Most of the time, what we did today is good enough to advance, even if not as strong as capable of. Equaling the scores and open frames at the district championship meet is what we need to do win the other third.

Losing to the Bulldogs is a lesson about scoring average of 204 is solid and good enough to advance to the final eight, but not always the best opportunity as the meet progresses. Scores have to increase, get better against that team playing at a level above everyone else, which was the case when Melbourne faced us."

The Blue Darters percentage of open frames to total amount of frames thrown increased from six at the district championship meet to 11 at the state championship meet.

"Small increase, but we are now in the position of having to win every series to continue to advance," Campbell said. "Not always the best opportunity when scoring 204 pins because little differentiates teams still competing when the second day arrives."

Twelve games were competed in by the Blue Darters during the tournament.

The 10-pin component saw Apopka score 4329 pins, a 216.5 average and the number-one seed. Lowest number of pins scored for an individual game was 182 pins. Fifteen of the 20 scores reached at least 205 pins.

"Only eight teams are still competing for the state championship at the end of day," Campbell said. "Survive and advance, cliché but the mission and accomplished so far."

Isaiah Jackson qualified for the individual competition. By a 2-0 count, Jackson won the first series.
