

Blue Darters focusing on finishing games properly

With a full schedule ahead for the 2021 Apopka Blue Darters football team, Jeff Rolson begins his third season as the head coach of the Blue Darters.

Apopka is 20-6 under Rolson and has made deep runs in the playoffs each season. However, the coaches and players will tell you that both seasons should have and certainly could have ended with the Blue Darters hoisting the Class 8A state championship trophy.

In 2019, there was a 13-point late fourth-quarter lead that evaporated and led to a 21-20 loss to Miami Christopher Columbus and in 2020, it was a 24-14 fourth-quarter lead in a state semifinal that Sanford Seminole turned into a 28-24 victory and the state title the following week, easily defeating Kissimmee Osceola 38-10.

With those two disappointments looming in their minds, Apopka coaches and players have a focus on finishing for the upcoming 2021 season.

"Obviously, the past two years have been

great seasons, but we haven't finished," Rolson said.

"We talked about the fine line between winning and losing. It's a razor's edge sometimes. We have to make sure we're holding each other accountable and that we're getting the job done, and paying attention to all the tasks. I think the kids understand that and they relate to the fact that we've got to finish. That's from us (coaches) and them (players) as well. I think they understand that and we'll see how it plays out."

Nikai Martinez, who is one of three fouryear starters for the Blue Darters and a leader on the Apopka defense, left no doubt as to how the team will approach the 2021 regular season.

When he was asked about what the team needs to do to finish the season after losing out on a great chance of winning the past two state championships, Martinez broke it down even further.

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Position group pictures for each team will appear in the Aug. 27 edition of *The Apopka Chief*.

Mustangs facing several adjustments this season

The Wekiva players on the Mustangs' football team aren't just facing the challenge of adjusting to a new coaching staff. Nor is the new coaching staff just facing the challenge of adjusting to replacing around 75 percent of the personnel. As the new season approaches, the program is facing both challenges.

"Progress has been steady though," coach Jeremiah Schwartz said when fall practices began. "Every day, every practice, we are further ahead of where we were when starting (Schwartz took over in January). The players and coaches value practicing with purpose. The big picture is understood more and more. For us, the big picture started with the most basic fundamental of sports, gaining experience toward what being an athlete entails."

Wekiva has earned a 57-23 record and six berths into the FHSAA postseason tournament over the past seven seasons.

"The specific area where progression has taken place the most is understanding what

being an athlete entails," Schwartz said. "It's been most noticeable over the last month as well. The intensity and amount of dedication has always been strong. However, what is dedicated to has expanded beyond the present. Attention what we are doing now affects how moving forward has developed.

"Waiting for the coaches' directions is no longer the norm for the players as an example. The players are now making decisions and taking actions essential to creating practices in which a routine is followed. Nor are decisions made and actions taken limited to during practices. Dedication to the overall goal of steady improvement at the highest level starts with having a purpose when practicing."

A significant number of Mustangs have experience playing football. However, less than 25 percent of the players have experience lining up for a high school varsity team. Only two starters return for the Mustangs.

"Making progression is the first step in general," Schwartz said. "Given the steadiness with which progression continues to be made, is a good first step for us. Moving forward is always a positive compared to standing still or even going backwards. Measurement is in comparison to where Wekiva was at the beginning and from the intra-team perspective. Again, though, at this stage the coaches know what we can do against ourselves.

"Eventually every team has to ask the same general question though. How quick of a pace is the progress when measuring ourselves against opponents? The point of sports is to compete against other teams."

"The abilities, talent and skill set are more refined, better applied every day, in practice," Schwartz said. "We are still learning how to apply the skill-set and talent at the same level consistently which is the next step of progress. Execution isn't always consistent from play to play. Alternating between weighty and non-tangible yardage gained is the tangible result. Moving from competitive to winning requires improving how efficiently skill set and talent is applied."

Wekiva will run a spread offense with pro-style emphasis.

Generally, pro-style offenses place a premium on a balance as far as design of the plays. In order to achieve balance, the use of multiple formations is a principal focus. Employing fullbacks and tight ends works hand in hand. Rushing is primarily built on zone and stack rushing schemes at the line. Intention is to create open space beyond the tight ends and tackles at the linebacker level, into which the ballcarrier slides.

Play-action is the trigger for the passing attack. The rushing attack has to gain significant yards for play-action to effectively cause confusion among the defense.

Perhaps no position more illustrates the Mustangs' need for consistency than quarterback. Elijah Rooney and Tyra Davis saw limited time last season as backups. Neither has performed at a level consistently detrimental to the team. However, the performances haven't included an overall consistently high component either.

Ability to execute plays gaining significant yardage and creating damage to defenses has been shown by both quarterbacks. Executing successive plays with the specific

end result of keeping the chains moving downfield or possession has yet to be shown by either as well.

The running back position will be by committee as of right now. James Brown, Romell Smith, and Terrell Weathers will be assigned the majority of the rushes and running back responsibilities. Use of H-backs and tight ends vary in offenses with a pro-style emphasis. The roles will be filled by Omar Haynes, Sincere Edwards, and Tamareon Foster

Chris Reed, Justin Hutchinson, and Mike Foster form the core of the wide receivers.

With the addition of Hakeem Lowe, Wekiva can also employ an athlete or player who can contribute from every skilled position.

Edyson Edmond (right tackle), Giodanny Negron (right guard), Jakoby Lowery (center), Holly Saintmelus (left guard), and Davion Watkins (left tackle) are the most likely offensive line.

The lone returning starter on offense is Lowery. However, Lowe is a senior transfer who previously started.

Wekiva will line up in the 4-2-5 and 3-4 formations on defense.

Primary tangible advantage of utilizing the 4-2-5 is the more defensive lineman, the more likely potential gaps at the line are turned into non-existent. Clogging the middle of the line is the trigger for successfully executing the 4-2-5. Forcing offenses to run plays away from the middle of the line, significantly creates uncertainty for offenses.

Secondary is made up of two safeties, two cornerbacks and a nickelback. The nickelback functions as a cornerback though, playing on every down.

The 4-2-5 is also an advantage for teams whose forte is speed. Reaction is when the ball is snapped, instead of while reading the play before.

Creating more pressure at the line reduces the amount of time defensive players have to cover receivers while running routes. If pressure isn't created though, there's still five players in the secondary.

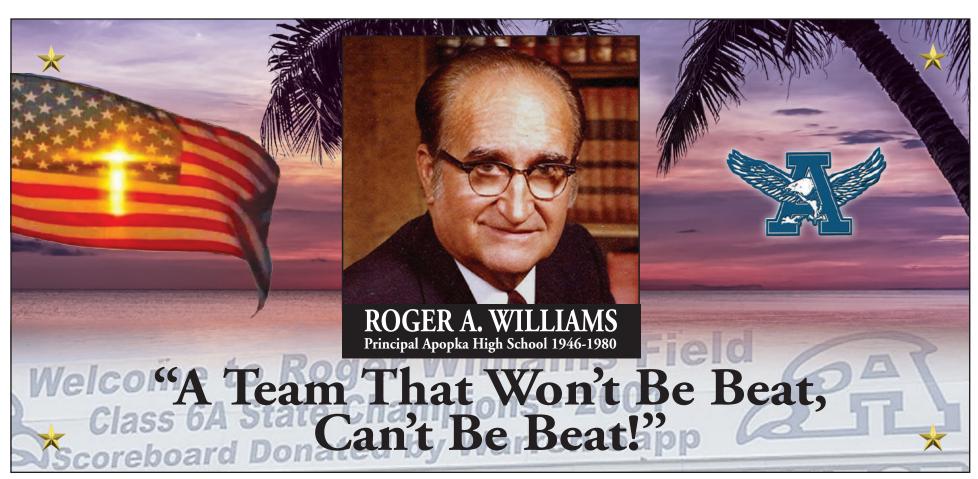
"Who is known for the most part on defense," Schwartz said. "However, we have a lot of moving pieces in general, which means the what and when is still to be determined. Moving pieces is even more so

"Instead of finishing the season, we need to finish games," the senior cornerback said. "We need to get through the fourth quarter the way we get through the first, second, and third quarters. That's really the goal for this year."

Martinez, who has committed to play college football at the University of Central Florida, said that learning to finish games and win tough playoff contests is done when the team is griding in practice.

"Every day in practice is like the fourth quarter. Who's going to lay down when it's time to run that last sprint? Who's going to lay down when we do fourth-and-one? Who's going to quit and who's going to survive? Whoever survives, that's who we want to have in there in the fourth quarter. In those big games, when it's win-or-go-home, even when it's not. That's really the goal, to finish, finish, finish."

Senior linebacker Josiah Robinson, who is also a four-year starter for the Blue Darters, echoed Martinez's statement on what the team needs to do in 2021.

"For us this year, we've got to stay in it," Robinson said. "We've got to prepare right and our mentality has to be right. Like Nikai said, we've got to finish. When it comes to the third and fourth quarter, the nitty-gritty, when it's a close game, we can't just lay down or we can't just lay off the gas pedal when we're up. We've got to keep on the gas until that fourthquarter bell."

Robinson has committed to Coastal

Another senior, offensive lineman Dyson Hurlburt, said those losses deep in the playoffs will serve as motivation for the Blue Darters this season.

"Most of us who are seniors were there as sophomores for the state championship game. We all know how it felt and we know how it felt last season," Hurlburt said.

"I think we really have the mindset and the heart that we have to get it done this year. We know what we want to do and we know what we're gonna do. It'll mean a lot to me being at Apopka all four years with my brothers. It'll mean a lot to get a ring this year."

Defensive lineman Kaven Call is just a junior, but the 2021 season will be the third year he's been a starter, so he understands the disappointment suffered in the past two

"Even though I'm coming up on my

junior season, I can't take it for granted. I can't we're up in the air about and still some spots just say, 'Oh, I've got another season. I have another chance at a ring," Call said.

"I've got to treat this like it's my last season, too, like it's my senior season. I've got to put everything on the line this year to get a ring because that second-place feeling is still in my mouth and I don't like it, so we've got to push and I know we will because we're going to train harder than ever. To finish this season (as state champion) would mean everything and I've got to treat it as my last."

Offensive changes

As the Blue Darters did in the spring jamboree against Dr. Phillips and Winter Park, they will move to the spread offense, but don't plan to become pass happy all of a sudden.

Rolson said he wants to pass the ball about 15 times a game and keep Apopka's traditionally strong running game intact.

"I think we'll take what the defense gives us, but we definitely want to be able to run the ball. We want to have a physical run game, a physical scheme," Rolson said.

Getting new quarterback Andrew McClain ingrained in the new Apopka offense is important. He transferred earlier this year from Seminole High, the team that knocked the Blue Darters out of the playoffs in a Class 8A state semifinal game last year.

"There's more quarterback run stuff that we can do that we haven't done because you don't want to get your guy hurt in spring or at camp. There's some single wing stuff that we'll be hanging on to and repping so it will give us an opportunity to have a couple of packages that we can shovel the guys in."

To get those offensive packages set for the season, the first week of practice that began Monday, August 2, saw more intense work on that side of the ball since no contact was allowed during the first five practices.

Prior to practice beginning, Rolson said, "It's going to be about installation and timing. It's easier to practice offense without pads than it is defense, but we'll be concentrating on personnel groupings and our scheme stuff, and develop and solidify our depth chart."

Defensive depth chart

Even though the depth chart is fairly well set for the Apopka defense, Rolson said that nobody's starting job is guaranteed.

"You've got guys who are capable of starting but they've got to go out there and practice. If you can beat a guy out, it might happen week three. There are still some spots we've got to get some depth at," he said.

"We don't write anything in ink and say, 'You're the guy and that's where you stay.' It seems like we always make changes at some point in the season where we've got to move a guy. We may find out we're just not getting it done in a spot and maybe our next guy in the position needs to start there and so we take one of those guys and move him somewhere else to strengthen that. We'll have to see how that plays out."

Season ahead

With the pandemic having thrown high school football schedules for a loop last season, the 2021 season, while scheduled to be a full 10-game regular season, there are major changes to the Class 8A districts, especially in Central Florida as Apopka is now in a district that doesn't include longtime rival West Orange. Since districts were established more than 50 years ago, the Blue Darters and the high school in Winter Garden - either Lakeview or West Orange – have been in the same district. This season, however, the Warriors are in District 8A-9 along with Osceola and Dr. Phillips, while Apopka is in

District 8A-4.

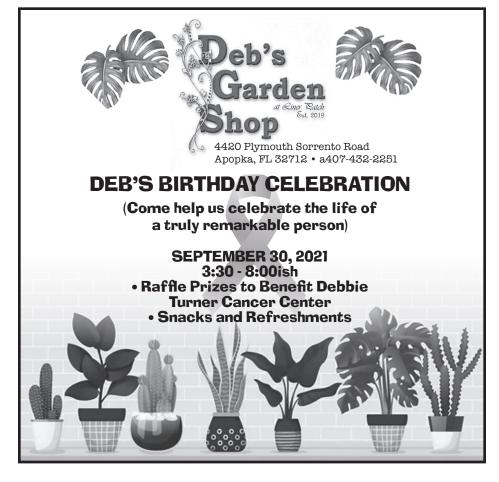
Joining the Blue Darters in that district are Ocoee, Evans, Lake Brantley, and Ocala West Port

Apopka will be a heavy favorite to dominate the district, but the vast majority of the Blue Darters' non-district foes reads like a who's who list of perennial playoff contenders. In those games, the Darters will play West Orange, Dr. Phillips, Edgewater, Lakeland, Wekiya, and Colonial.

Although Colonial is certainly no powerhouse, the Grenadiers were 3-6 last season under head coach Donny Hodges and joining Colonial this season is longtime area coach Bill Gierke, who will serve as the defensive coordinator.

The open date for the Blue Darters doesn't come until eight regular-season games have been played and will be on October 22. Homecoming is set for the week prior on October 15 against West Port. Senior night will be in the final game of the regular season against hometown rival Wekiva on November 5. The Blue Darters have one Thursday game on October 28 when they host Lake Brantley.

Coaching staff

There are some changes to the coaching staff as Rolson begins his third season as the Blue Darters' head coach.

Mark Barrett served on the Apopka football staff from 2014 to 2016 but moved to Texas until earlier this year. He worked with the team some during spring practice in May, commuting from Texas to Apopka for about half the practices. Now, he's back full-time

and will coach the quarterbacks as well as call the plays for the Apopka offense.

Bill Caughell will coach the offensive line, while former Apopka quarterback Zack Darlington will also work with the quarterbacks.

Jett Davison will coach running backs and Dawson Shreiner will serve as coach of the wide receivers

Rolson will continue serve as defensive coordinator and coach linebackers, while Tv Parker will help with the overall defense, concentrating on the safeties. Marcus Neeson will coach cornerbacks and longtime Apopka assistant Matt Anderson will again coach the defensive line.

Dave Newell, who once was an assistant coach, has returned to help out on defense as he will coach outside linebackers and coordinate the nickel pass coverage packages.

Working both on Friday nights with the varsity and during the week with the Apopka High freshman football team will be Kelvin Joyner, Dion Williams, and Chris Barnes. In addition, Rodney Hodges will continue to serve as a staff member, especially on Fridays during games.

for the defense though. Determining any concrete, definitive answers to the what and when usually requires a few games. However, needing a few games to determine concrete, definitive answers for the who and what is even more so for the defense. Youth and inexperience are why again. When the lights are turned on and directed to the players is the best measurement of what and when.

"And part of the bright lights is more room for a mistake on offense than defense. If offense loses yardage because of a mistake involving execution, the play is wasted. However, the offense has four plays to work with during each series. Making a mistake on defense can result in the offense scoring a sudden and unexpected touchdown. The defense can't take the touchdown off the scoreboard on the next play. Long touchdowns almost always change the complexion of a game."

The defensive line will be manned by Sincere Edwards, Traveon Rudolph, Davion Watkins, and George Reid.

The linebacker core consists of Donovan

Knight and Quadar Cargill.

Tamareon Foster (safety), Noah Putnam (safety), Jeremy Rudolph (cornerback), Jabari Smith (cornerback), and Matt Perkins (nickelback) make up the secondary.

The lone returning starter on defense is Foster. However, Foster is the player best suited to deal with the situation. Foster has been a starter for the last two seasons while leading the team in interceptions as well as pass break ups. The most tackles among the secondary last season were also made by Foster.

"Importance of the difference in managing the emotional response between inexperience and experience is utmost, too," Schwartz said. "Failure to consider the emotional response and its effect needs to change in order to consistently win is a big mistake. A team isn't going to always lead. The level of focus among teams which consistently wins remains the same regardless of emotional swings during a game. A part of the big picture is understanding the game is 48 minutes long and each play adds up to the outcome. The more experience a team has dealing with the emotional swings, the better

managed.

"The cancellation of junior varsity competition for 2020 also factors into the pace of progression. However, every team is dealing with the unknown effects of a cancelled junior varsity season."

The 2021 schedule is made up of Olympia (Aug. 27, away), Ocoee (Sept. 3, away), West Orange (Sept. 10, home), Lake Nona (Sept. 24, away), Davenport Ridge Community (Oct. 1, home), Evans (Oct. 8, home), Edgewater (Oct. 15, away), Clermont East Ridge (Oct. 22, home), Winter Haven (Oct. 29, away) and Apopka (Nov. 5, away).

Automatic berths into the state playoffs (FHSAA postseason tournament) are earned by the district champions. District champs are seeded no lower than fourth in the region. Each of the four regions in the state are divided into four districts. A point system (Maxpreps.com) determines the four wildcard, at-large berths in each region and seedings. The better the records of opponents, the more points are earned.

A running back, Coach Schwartz played for Bill Gierke at Edgewater and graduated in 2008. Iowa State and Hampton University

made up Schwartz's collegiate career. When coaching called, Schwartz began coaching at Durham University in England (about 155 miles south of Scotland) while pursuing a master's degree in education. Since returning to the states, Schwartz has been a part of coaching staffs for Hialeah Gardens, Miami Norland, Oak Ridge, and Orangewood Christian. Milburn Duverna, Jeremy Gallon, Buddy Hurd, Keith Ivey, Jerry Middleton, Clearance Pankey, Max Purcell, Cedric Reese, Josh Robinson, and George Spearman serve as assistant coaches.

"Skill-set and talent is good enough to compete right now," Schwartz said. "Experience across the entire range is the greatest strength and weakness right now though. Every decision and direction will continue for the immediate future to be dictated by experience across the entire range possessed. Making the move to the varsity level is the biggest definitive and individual challenge this season. Youth means a lot of learning, and adjusting to the requirements of athletic competition has been achieved. A lot more is required as the regular season begins as well though."

Apopka Amphitheater

The Apopka Amphitheater is located at the Fields of Fame, Northwest Recreation Complex, 3710 Jason Dwelley Parkway, Apopka. The 223-acre complex is located west of Rock Springs Road and east of Plymouth-Sorrento Road between Ponkan Road and Kelly Park Road.

The amphitheater's bandshell covers a large stage area and fixed-seating for 1,362 people. An open-air lawn provides additional seating that will accommodate up to 5,000 people. The concession building with public restrooms and ticket box office is located nearby.

The amphitheater is encircled with a wide, paved. and well-lighted walkway, which provides an excellent location for vendor/display booths on either side.

Close by, there is a large, waterfront open-air pavilion that is also available for vendor or private rentals. The park has more than 1,500 paved parking spaces, and unpaved parking for overflow parking during high-volume events that provides around 3,000 additional spaces.

The amphitheater stage is equipped with two 400-amp hook-ups or lighting and one
