*A storage and maintenance facility for helicopters at Fire Station 4 at 2750 Orange Avenue in the Plymouth area of Apopka. The City Council has approved the use of the fire

station property for a medical emergency helicopter to be housed on the fire station property and the company, Air Methods, seeks to put a 3,600-square foot hangar for the helicopter, as well as a small storage building and a small building for minor maintenance on the helicopter. Major maintenance would be done elsewhere.

*The major development plan of Magnolia Terrace, a proposed residential development of single-family houses and townhomes off Johns Road and Binion Road.



should let the 60-day mask mandate sunset, and allow for parents to opt their children out of wearing a mask if they want to.

My outlook on this has always been the same. I have always advocated for using the positivity rates as our guide. I asked the board to look at rates when we were deciding when to open schools last year. I agreed to removing a mask mandate this summer when rates had fallen. I was the first board member who asked for a mandate to be put back in place when rates started climbing at the end of July.

As of Wednesday, October 27, 2021, the Florida Department of Health is reporting that Orange County's 14-day rolling positivity rate is 3.51 percent. It is important to note that Orange County's 14-day rolling positivity rate has been below 5 percent for 17 consecutive days.

This is the fifth day the positivity rate is at 4% or below. Eligible residents (12+) who have one vaccine dose are at 75 percent. At this point I feel we

have always said that when rates are consistently below five to seven percent, we can move forward with less restrictive mitigation measures.

That is what is considered by the medical community to be a low transmission rate.

I have always followed the science and watched the data. That is why this decision is so clear to me.

We are now at an extremely low rate of

transmission. This virus is not spreading like it was. Our hospitals are not overwhelmed and overflowing with Covid patients anymore. In fact, one of our major area hospitals is only seeing a few positive cases daily now in all of their hospitals.

I believe it is time to allow families to choose to remove masks if they want to and feel comfortable with that. Some families will still want to mask their kids and that is fine too.

I wish we could celebrate this milestone in this pandemic for what it is - a great success. It took longer than it should have, but we are finally at a good place. Is this virus gone? No. It may never be, but it is not ravaging our community right now and treatment options are working well as readily available vaccines.

I'm feeling hopeful once again that children will soon see their friends' smiles and school will be a happy place where the weight of a pandemic doesn't loom.

Our kids deserve that.

Mustangs seeking fourth win in five games at Winter Haven

A victory over the Winter Haven Blue Devils would be the fourth over the course of the last five contests for the Wekiva Mustangs. Role of the favorite is also held by Wekiva for a second consecutive contest. Wekiva is 3-5, while Winter Haven is 1-8. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. today, Friday, October 29, at Winter Haven.

The Mustangs are vying to secure second place in the District 7A-6 standings. Wekiva is 2-1 for Wekiva, while Winter Haven is 1-2. Also at 1-2 is Ridge Community. East Ridge at 0-3. At 4-0, Edgewater has clinched the 2021 district championship.

"Finishing second is important in the sense of achieving another measurable watershed mark," Mustangs coach Jeremiah Schwartz said. "Opportunities to continue to progress while preparing for next season are important. We aren't nearly as young and inexperienced as at the start of the season. However, age and experience are still measurably less than most of the teams faced. A full season playing at the varsity level hasn't been completed yet. Measurable, tangible achievements are important for a team at the moving past the as raw as possible stage. Building on and looking at the tangible, measurable achievements as

blueprints during the offseason is the starting point for continuing the progression.

"Right now, though, the focus is on and victories are needed to keep alive any opportunity to earn a playoff berth. We need to win the last two contests of the season."

With the fourth victory over the course of the last five contests, Wekiva would enter the annual contest and season finale against Apopka in the best possible position compared to the midway mark of the season, too. At that point, Wekiva's record was 0-4. Three of the loss were by a combined 16 points.

"Winning the first contest is the first step of consistently winning," Schwartz said. "However, teams can't win until learning how to win and the only means is through experience. We failed to convert potential victories into actual or secure victories. We didn't know how to win or take the final steps which turn a potential victory into an actual victory. Three of the first four losses and contests we gave up leads."

"We had never won before and needed a blueprint for how to win. Expectation was a lot of growing pains or trials and tribulations before developing the blueprint for winning. The coaches kept the faith that the first win would breed more. Undergoing experiences of failing to and successfully executing how to win is the only means of learn-

ing. Specifically, mistakes opening the door for opponents to erase leads have been reduced. Makeup and disposition of the team continuing to evolve during the season is a part of the growing pains. However, the evolution throughout the season has been with the end intention of reducing those kinds of mistakes."

"Winning against the next tier of teams requires more specific progression, though," Schwartz said. "And this contest against the Blue Devils is another opportunity for the progression to continue."

The record of 1-8 alone indicates Winter Haven is ripe for an easy effort producing a similar performance and end result as the previous.

The Blue Devils average 20.5 points per contest, though. Every contest has seen at least 14 points scored. During four contests, Winter Haven has scored 20 points. A high mark of 26 has been reached.

"A much better offense than what we have faced during the last month or so in terms of advancing down the field," Schwartz said. "Ridge Community, Evans, and Edgewater scored points on long gains or were set up by long gains. No points were scored by East Ridge. As good as Edgewater is and for all the success, the attack was C.J. Baxter and Jeremiah Connally. Baxter and Connally gained about 80 percent of the total yards. Each of the four touchdowns were set up or

scored by gains of at least 25 yards or possession was taken over on our side of the field."

"Seven different players average a gain of at least four yards per touch for the Blue Devils. Winter Haven doesn't score with the same proficiency in terms of the average or explosiveness as some of the other opponents. However, three-and-outs are rare, less than a handful per contest. Moving the ball is steady as well as systematic and results are consistent. Enough points are scored by the offense to win more than one contest, particularly if overlooked or not taken seriously because of the record."

The Blue Devils employ the entire gambit of formations and offensive concepts equally. The rush-to-pass ratio is 60-40. Statistically, yards gain matches the scoring totals. Steady as well as systematic and the consistent result of enough to win, Winter Haven averages 156 yards rushing and 110 yards passing per contest. Sixty-four passes in total have been hauled in for an average of 13.7 yards.

On the other side of the ball though, the Blue Devils give up 36 points with a low of 27.

The 4-2-5 is employed on defense. The secondary rotates between cover three, cover-four, and man-to-man coverage.


er, linebackers blitz often, attempting to collapse the pocket from the edge.

"Albeit with long odds, we still can qualify for the playoffs," Schwartz said. "Of course, we have to win both of the remaining contests to begin with."

"Not only does the possibility of qualifying for the playoffs end with a loss. A loss would be as major and damaging as possible to the progress we have made over the season. Although we are 3-5, three of the five losses have been by nine or less points. Two weeks ago, we were still in a position to defeat the two-time state finalist until about six minutes were left. Difference between 3-5 and 6-2 is the subtle components of execution lacking or mistakes committed during about a dozen plays. Losing means multiple steps backward to consistent execution lacking, which starts with how serious preparation and practice is pursued."



The bass were bitin' on the Harris Chain last weekend. It's been takin' 25 to 30 pounds for five bass to win tournaments on the chain. While I was out of town, my buddy Rick fished the Harris Chain and caught a few bass, includin' a 4 pounder. He said it was kinda slow but, hey, any time you get on the water it's a good thing.

John and his nephew Chet are still catchin' numbers of bass on the Butler Chain. They haven't caught any big ones lately, but they are catchin' 18 to 20 bass per trip as of late. So, if you want to go and catch some bass, the Butler Chain may be a great place to catch some

bass. Most of the bass are bein' caught on plastic worms and slow-sinkin' Senko-type baits.

ing 50 yards, the Mustangs took the lead for good on the third play from scrimmage with a pass.
