

Rainfall in water district was below average for much of the area

January brought well below average rainfall to the region with Marion County receiving the least amount of rain for the month at .83 inches for the St. Johns River Water Management District. Apopka and Northwest Orange County are in the St. Johns water

district. The districtwide total of 1.2 inches is less than half the average rainfall for January.

A full report outlining January's hydrologic conditions was presented at the district's Governing Board meeting on Tuesday, February 8.

Highlights include:

Rainfall

*Districtwide, January rainfall averaged 1.19 inches, which is 1.42 inches below the average for the month.

*The county with the highest rainfall total was Indian River,

which received 1.9 inches of rain.

*Districtwide, the cumulative rainfall total for the past 12 months is 52.33 inches, which is 1.32 inches above the long-term average.

Groundwater

*Upper Floridan aquifer condi-


tions (groundwater levels) at the end of January were a mix of high and normal conditions across most of the district. In the central region, water levels in many of the wells decreased more than 10

You can track your requests, receive email updates, and stay informed

of where the work is in the process. In this situation, Orange County and the city of Apopka are working together with the HOA that pays for the wall repairs, to prevent future wall cave-ins.

This one is not a fast fix, but it has to start somewhere.

Then, there are other quick cases. My aide was on Wymore Road in District 2 after a rainstorm. A large pothole opened up.

She immediately called 311. By the next morning, the pothole was repaired.

A speed limit sign waver in the wind or fall - all the way down to the ground can be put back up quickly or a traffic light that's not working can be repaired fast. 311 receives those calls all the time. It takes all of us to fix these issues.

share a couple bills that are being considered that I think are important.

The first one is House Bill 59 (HB59) by Representative Hawkins. This bill would require electrocardiograms for student-athletes. If you are a parent in OCPS with a child in sports, you know that our school board already put this requirement in place this school year.

All of our athletes are now required to get an electrocardiogram at least once in their four years of high school. When we considered this rule, there were some concerns about the feasibility of requiring such a test for all students in athletics, but through a partnership with a non-profit, we were able to ensure that all students had access to the test.

Many doctors, like my daughter's own pediatrician, are able to give the simple noninvasive test in their offices and they take

less than five minutes to administer. Already this year, we have had several student-athletes who have had a previously undetected heart problem be identified by this test. For that reason, I think this is a great bill to move ahead for the state.

Another great bill is Senate Bill 400 (SB400) by our own Senator Randolph Bracy. This bill requires school districts to inform students and parents of certain acceleration, academic, and career planning options when they enter ninth grade. It also requires that a career plan be developed in consultation with a school counselor.

As the parent of high schoolers in OCPS, I know that all this information is available on our district website but requiring schools to inform families of the options available to a student beyond what is required for graduation is an important step to making sure kids reach their potential.

There are so many op-

tions available to kids as far as class choices and even career and technical education choices that I think get overlooked because students and parents just don't know they are available, and this bill looks to remedy that.

These are just two of the many bills working their way through committee discussions, and House and Senate debates. I strongly encourage community members to read up on the current bills being proposed. Go to leg.state.fl.gov to explore the Florida Senate and Florida House sites to see information on current bills. As always, reach out to me if you would like more information.

The work of the Florida Legislature during the legislative session affects all of us. This is when they need to hear your voices so they know what voters want. Don't be afraid to take part in the decisions that will eventually affect you and your community.
