our district to further successes. That is what made this so difficult. In my opinion, both candidates have tremendous attributes – as should be expected in candidates for this position.

So, I had to really dig deep and think about where we are at this moment in time, what we are going to be faced with in the future, and where I want to see the district in that future.

So, this is where I landed. Our school district is NOT a floundering school district that needs saving with a whole new reboot. In fact, it's quite the opposite. Districts and school boards from around the state and country reach

out to us all the time for advice and consultation because we are a highly successful district.

But we do have a big problem - we have a significant morale problem that needs immediate attention. So, the question is: Who can keep us on the successful track we are on, yet tweak the culture in a way that positively impacts our staff? I believe Dr. Maria Vazquez is that person.

I have worked very closely with Dr. Vazquez over the past couple of years and I knew from those interactions that her knowledge, her drive, her attention to detail would make her an excellent superintendent but I did have concerns the same as some

that I heard from constituents, that if we went with someone from within, nothing would change in the culture.

So, I addressed this very directly and bluntly in my one-on-one interview with Dr. Vazquez. She is very aware of this issue and has a clear plan to tackle the problem. When you read her 100-day entry plan, she acknowledges in the opening paragraph that we have made incredible progress over the last decade, yet we face some challenges. The common theme throughout her plan is listening and learning. She frequently reiterates her desire to listen to

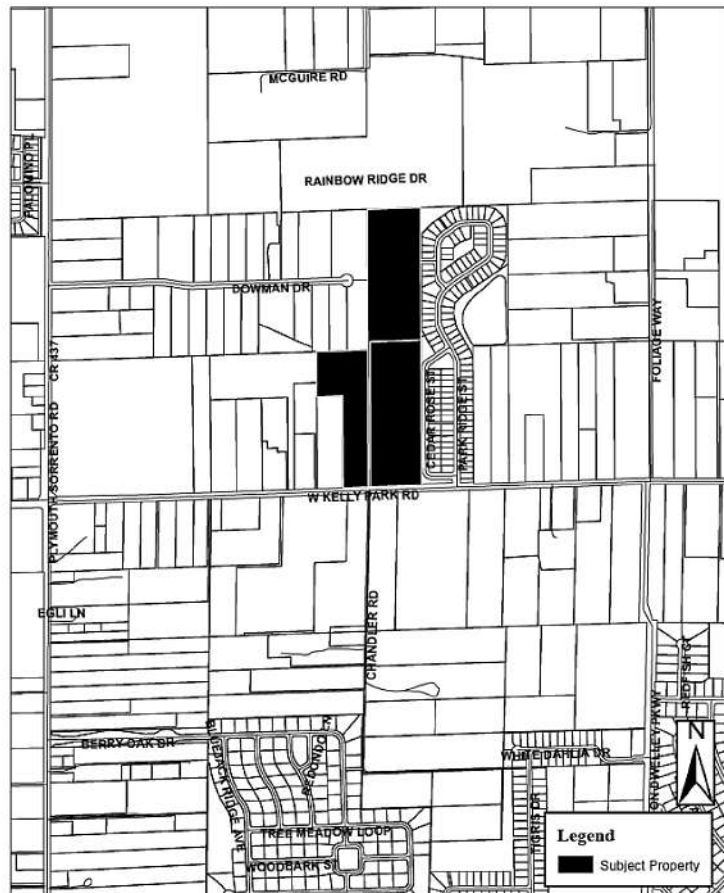

fireworks use.

*Use fireworks on hard, flat surfaces; if you shoot on grass, lay down a plywood board as your hard, flat surface.

*Have water readily available for emergencies (hose is best; fire extinguisher or bucket of water will work).

*Keep plenty of distance

between the launch site and spectators – 150 ft. for aerials and 35-50 ft. for ground items; and shoot in a clear open area.

*Brace your aerials, tubes, and fountains with bricks to avoid tip-over.

*Use safety gear (safety glasses and gloves) when lighting fireworks.

*Keep pets inside during fireworks use (the noise can

frighten animals).

*Douse your fireworks thoroughly with water when you are finished and dispose of them in a covered metal container outdoors and away from any buildings.

*Clean up when the show is over, which includes picking up any debris that may fall into your neighbors' property.
