

But, back to the two female architects who designed the Orlando bandstand in the 1920s. The concept of women in the field of architecture was very uncommon a hundred years ago. Their struggle for acceptance and employment in a male dominated field is inspiring to me as the first female District 2 commissioner.

Before Roberts moved to Orlando, she worked for Frank Lloyd Wright as a draftsperson-architect. Her business partner, Ryan, was the first woman to receive a master's degree in architecture from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. After working in Massachusetts, she, like Ryan, relocated to Central

partnership firm was chosen to design a new Lake Eola band shell. During the 1920s boom, the women designed several other landmark buildings including the First Unitarian Church's Unity Chapel, the Amherst Apartments, a home called Villa Formosa, and other notable buildings in St. Cloud. The authors of the documentary film could hardly find pictures of the two women or proof of their designs being utilized. People were simply not much interested in women's history and did not record their achievements. I wish I could share a picture of their brilliant and sophisticated stylings. They do exist today, however. I'm motivated to locate and view the few mentioned properties still standing on Lk. Formosa and in the City of St. Cloud.

The history lecture focused on how difficult it was for women to succeed in professional careers. It wasn't until the 1970s that a woman could own her own bank account.

These two women could not even join a professional organization as

women when one even worked for famed architect, Frank Lloyd Wright. Like - what could an architect achieve more than a degree from MIT and working for one of the most famed architects in the world?

It was pure and simple discrimination. To go on further, women couldn't keep custody of their children even if they divorced an abusive spouse. When these things were mentioned, those in attendance gasped. How could these indignities have existed in the United States of America? Well, they did, and it is good to remember the progress that has been made.

I owe much of my success to a strong mother and hard-working grandmother. My grandmother was the first woman in Minnesota to compete in lake swimming competitions along with boys.

I am inspired to learn more about these two female architects Ida Ryan and Isabel Roberts.

May all our young girls aspire to such great heights. It is truly important to celebrate Women's History Month.

Reader asks about withdrawing application for Social Security

and reached my full retirement age in July 2022. My wife and I are discussing whether we should take Social Security now or wait until we are age 70 to get a higher benefit. I remember reading that you can start Social Security and, if not needed, pay it back within a year and then "reset" to get a higher benefit by waiting longer. Please describe the steps of this process to take now and repay the year's benefits if we do not need them. Signed: Uncertain

Dear Uncertain: Well, to exercise the so-called "do over option" (which is essentially withdrawing your application for benefits), you need to contact Social Security (1-800-772-1213 or your local SS field office) and request that your application for benefits be withdrawn. You can also download and complete form SSA-521 and deliver the same to your local Social Security office. You can get that form at this link: www.ssa.gov/forms/ssa-521.pdf.

This "do-over option" is only available within 12 months of the date you submit your application and can only be done once in your lifetime. If you use it, you will be required to repay Social Security for all payments made on your behalf, including not only your monthly payments but also any income taxes you had withheld, and any Medicare premiums which were withheld from your monthly payments (Social Security will inform you how much you must repay). Once the repayment is made,

Dear Rusty: I will be 67 next month it will be as though you never applied for benefits, meaning your benefit amount will be higher when you later re-apply (which would also be the case if you simply didn't apply - your benefit entitlement continues to grow until you claim, up to age 70 when your maximum SS benefit is attained). This process would be the same for both you and your wife.


However, I suggest you consider whether you really need to withdraw your application. Be aware that since you've already reached your full retirement age (FRA) you can claim now and, if you later decide you don't need the monthly SS money, you can simply temporarily suspend your benefit payments to avoid repaying Social Security everything they've already paid to you and on your behalf (you don't need to formally withdraw your application). By simply suspending (and not withdrawing), your benefit amount will start growing again with each month your benefits are suspended (about .67 percent more for each month you do not get benefits) and you can keep everything you've already received to the point you suspend your payments. To suspend your payments just call Social Security at the number provided above and tell them you wish to suspend your benefits and grow your payment amount. While you can only use the withdrawal process once in your lifetime, you can temporarily suspend your benefit payments multiple times if necessary.

President refuses to designate Mexican cartels as terrorist groups

Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody called President Joe Biden "trafficker-in-chief" last week in response to a White House spokesperson saying there's no need to designate Mexican cartels as

Foreign Terrorist Organizations (FTOs). On Wednesday, White House press secretary Karine Jean-Pierre told reporters, "Designating these cartels as FTOs would not grant us any additional authorities that we don't really have at this time. The United States has powerful sanctions authorities specifically designated to combat narcotics trafficking organizations and the individuals and entities that enable them."

Jean-Pierre added: "In the last few months alone Treasury has announced a series of actions against cartels that are dangerous to the public safety and we have also taken action that further enables Treasury to sanction foreign persons," referring to the Treasury Department sanctioning members of the CJNG cartel and several Mexican companies linked to it last week, and sanctioning Sinaloa Cartel members and Mexican companies last month.

Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares led a coalition of 22 attorneys general last month calling on the president to designate the cartels as FTOs. Last September, Moody also led a coalition of 18 attorneys general calling on Biden to designate fentanyl as a weapon of mass destruction. In September, Texas Gov. Greg Abbott signed an executive order designating the Sinaloa and CJNG cartels as FTOs and called on the president to do the same. None received a response, until Jean-Pierre's comments

In response, Abbott tweeted Thursday, "Texas designated Mexican cartels as terrorist organizations last year. I've repeatedly urged Biden to do the same. Now, 2 Americans were shot & killed by cartels just across the Texas border. It's past time for Biden to step up & call these cartels what they are: terrorists."

Abbott's press office also confirmed that he hasn't heard from the president since he hand-delivered a border security plan to him in January listing five actions Biden could take to immediately secure the

Moody tweeted the president is now "Trafficker-in-Chief" citing his failure to secure the border, enabling human and drug trafficking facilitated by Mexican car-

In a statement emailed to The Center Square, she said the president "preventing the Mexican drug cartels from being designated federal terrorist organizations (which they are) [is] further evidence that he is the Trafficker-in Chief."

She thanked Florida's senior U.S. Sen. Rick Scott and Sen. Roger Marshall, R-Kansas, for introducing the Drug Cartel Terrorist Designation Act, which Moody said will "do the job Biden refuses to do – protect the American people."

The senators filed the bill on Wednesday to formally designate four Mexican cartels as FTOs: the Reynosa/Los Metros faction of the Gulf Cartel, Cartel Del Noreste faction of Los Zetas, the Jalisco New Generation Cartel and the Sinaloa cartel. The bill would prohibit individuals from entering the U.S. who knowingly provide "material support or resources" to these cartels. It also would ban any foreign citizen from entering the U.S. who are members of the designated cartels, or are formally associated with them or who have "engaged in terrorist activity" relating to

"For too long, Biden's botched border policies have prioritized criminals and cartels over legal immigration and Americans' safety," Scott said. "Dictators, cartels and bad guys around the world know that Biden is a weak appeaser with open border policies. They're taking full advantage by trafficking evil drugs like fentanyl across the southern border, poisoning our communities and killing our loved ones. Those who knowingly distribute these highly lethal drugs are declaring war on Americans and deserve to be held accountable and classified as the terrorists they are."

Montana Attorney General Austin Knudsen, who joined the attorneys general coalitions, told The Center Square, "The Biden administration's response to the border crisis has been feckless and an abject failure – and Americans are dying as a result. ... President Biden must take stronger action to secure the border and protect Americans, and he needs to do it now."

Mexican cartels are "assassinating rivals and government officials, ambushing, and killing Americans at the border, and engaging in an armed insurgency against the Mexican government," the coalition argues. "This dangerous terrorist activity occurring at our border will not abate unless we escalate our response."

Earlier this year, Biden said his plan to address the fentanyl crisis involved having "more drug detection machines," implementing greater inspection of cargo to "stop pills and powder [coming in through] the border," "working with couriers, like FedEx, to inspect more packages for drugs," and implementing "strong penalties to crack down on fentanyl trafficking."
