

Blue Darters looking to make breakthrough in state title game

The good news for the Apopka High School football team as it enters the 2023 season is that the Blue Darters have been in the state championship game three out of the past four seasons. The bad news is that the Darters are 0-3 in those contests.

In 2019, Apopka fell 21-20 to Miami Christopher Columbus with literally seconds left on the game clock after leading the Explorers by 13 points midway through the fourth period. In 2021, Venice was clearly the better team, downing the Blue Darters 35-7. Last season, there was another loss to Columbus, 16-13 in overtime.

During the COVID season of 2020, Apopka fell to Sanford Seminole 28-24 in a state semifinal game and the Seminoles went on to defeat Osceola in the state title game.

Most schools would love to have three championship-game losses or even three first-round playoff defeats, but for Apopka, it's not something that sits well and the Blue Darters are expecting another chance at making a strong playoff run in 2023.

Apopka head coach Jeff Rolson said losing in overtime last season is something he hated but not so much for himself, but for the players.

"I hate to lose. I hated it for them (Apopka players)," he said. "We had some kicking issues. We had some procedural issues in the kicking game. We had some sideline procedural issues with clock management, timeouts. And that's a disservice to our kids. It's disappointing. I hate to lose, but I could not step on the football field again ever and I'd be OK. I just want to give them the best. I enjoy them, so we want to give them the best opportunity."

Rolson was asked if he still hears talk about the way the 2022 state title game ended. "I don't hear about it," he said. "First of all, you're talking to a guy who has zero, no social media at all. What people say, I have no idea. If they want to talk to me, everybody's got my number or it's not hard to find. I'll talk to whoever wants to talk to me."

The Blue Darters begin the 2023 regular season today, Friday, August 25, with a road game at Ocoee. The Knights played Apopka close last season, losing 13-12. A rematch was nearly in the works for the state championship last season, but the Knights lost in the state semifinals to Columbus.

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Wekiva working toward third time to be the charm in playoffs

The 2023 season marks the third with Jeremiah Schwartz at the helm of the Wekiva Mustangs football team. Under Schwartz, the program has reached the strong potential to realize three times is a pattern stage. Three times being the three consecutive seasons Wekiva has continued to move forward under Schwartz's leadership.

As is often the case with a coach during the first season, personnel turnover among players and the coaching staff was way above the average number. The final record of 4-6 for the 2021 season was a step backward after 57-23 combined during the previous six seasons. More importantly, the Mustangs' streak of earning a berth into the FHSAA playoffs for six consecutive seasons came to an end.

Wekiva's record improved last season by one victory to 5-5. However, among the top 20 in the state and all classifications, strength of schedule propelled the Mustangs into the playoffs. Eight opponents earned berths into the playoffs and nine won at least seven contests.

A big step was taken as far as the overall state of the program with the 2022 regular-season finale victory over the Apopka Blue Darters. Determined with seven seconds left, the victory over Apopka was Wekiva's only path into the playoffs. However, the foray into the playoffs was a one-and-done experience, losing to the Jones Tigers for the second time. The final score of 27-13 reflected the Tigers' systematic, relentlessly steady, and mistake-free performance.

"Obviously, the logical tangible goal each season is to take the next step beyond where the previous season ended," Schwartz said. "Every team wants to keep progressing. Otherwise why play? In the case of the 2023 season and Wekiva, the next step is also obvious, winning during



the playoffs. Advancing past the first round of the playoffs is certainly a goal capable of achieving after earning a berth last season and with who is returning. Nor do I have a problem saying or proceeding into the season with the direction taken is predicated by the ambition of winning during the playoffs."

Overall state of the program moving forward grows out of the more specific ability to prepare for the upcoming season steadily improving first.

Then personnel turnover throughout the Mustangs' program is in general the most stable under Schwartz's leadership.

Players have only four years of eligibility at the high school level. So, addressing personnel turnover is almost always the first order of business during the offseason. Four of the five regular starting offensive linemen graduated last May. Most importantly, an heir apparent for the starting lineup hadn't emerged at all four of the positions when spring practice began. The offensive line was also the only position without an heir apparent entering spring practice.

"Earning the berth into the playoffs and winning during the playoffs starts with acclimating the new players to varsity level football during spring practice," Schwartz said. "Each player begins spring practice at a different stage of the acclimation process. The pace of acclimation is also different.

"The process was that much more important with the need to replace four offensive linemen in our case. In general, the longer the process takes, the longer we don't replace the linemen. Furthermore, the amount of time before a team can move forward usually doesn't take as long when replacing one player even at four different positions."

Multiple formations and designs broadly described as a pro-style set offense will continue to be used by Wekiva. Set to one side of the quarterback, the one-back formation and the common concepts used within the spread is the package's centerpiece.

However, the returning offensive lineman not only possesses the trait most needed, but with the most experience possible. Mhelakii Henriquez brings the experience of starting all 12 contests (including preseason) last season to the center position. Brock Billings (left tackle), Shyne Love (left guard), James Mixon (right guard), and Chase Edwards (right tackle) make up the rest of the starting offensive line.

The spring practice game marked the start of the third season with Ty'Ray Davis under center. A winning record and efficient quarterbacking function hand-inhand is apparent. Over the course of the

last two seasons, though, overall fortunes of the Mustangs and Davis' improvement as the quarterback have specifically been tied together. As a sophomore, Davis started half the contests, but the play was inconsistent. All 12 contests (including preseason) last season were started by Davis. From the beginning of his sophomore season (spring practice 2022), Davis has been the undisputed starting quarterback.

Davis has "improved by leaps and bounds due to several reasons," Schwartz said. "Gaining that first season of experience alone allowed for dramatic improvement. Then the passing game as a whole and Ty'Ray's individual play under center have clearly improved together. Passes are closer to the location intended and have more of a spiral form. Receivers have to adjust to the pass far less.

"Together examples, moving the ball inside the red zone via completed passes over 20 yards more than doubled between end of 2021 and start of 2022 seasons alone. The overall completion percentage rose significantly between end of 2021 and start of 2022 seasons. Then both statistics continued to significantly increase during the last year."

The biggest effect Davis' improvement had last season and even before the end was the connection developed with the other skilled players. Several plays grew

into big impact when needed from the connection last season.

None was more dramatic or held more weight than the final touchdown Wekiva scored during the 2022 regular season.

Davis completed a 10-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Josh Bennett with seven seconds remaining against the Blue Darters. The specific credential needed for Wekiva to surge into the FHSAA Class 3M playoffs was the 20-14 victory over Class 4M state finalist Apopka. Upward move in the seedings gained from the victory was not limited from outside the playoffs to inside though. The Mustangs jumped over two teams in the seedings, from the fifth to third wild card and ninth to seventh overall for Class 3M Region 1.

The 2022 season even began with a demonstration between the skilled players. Davis launched what would eventually become a 70-yard touchdown pass on the first play from scrimmage in the preseason Kickoff Classic against Pinellas Park.

Davis completed 77-of-142 pass attempts, 54 percent for 1,410 yards, an average of 18 yards last season. A 99.2 quarterback rating was also compiled. The improvement played a central role in Wekiva winning one more contest. Thus, qualifying for the playoffs.

who is going to be a Power 5 kid. That's going to be a solid group. I've got DBs, two who are scholarship-type kids, at that level. A couple of other kids are pretty good. "The defense is pretty solid."

Rolson said he expects quarterback Tyson Davison, who started as a freshman in 2022, to take a huge step in leading the Blue Darters, much as he did throughout the season last year. In the 16-13 overtime loss to Miami Columbus in the Class 4M state title game in 2022, Davison led all runners with 142 rushing yards on just 13 carries. He had one long run of 61 yards that resulted in a touchdown for Apopka. Davison was also 5-of-9 for 52 yards through the air. Those aren't great numbers, but the Darters don't need fantastic passing numbers, just enough to keep the defenses honest.

"Our quarterback was a difference-maker in the playoffs (in 2022) and he's going to be pretty good," Rolson said. "His maturity and decision-making down the stretch. He had some big plays. He had his best game in the state title game – reading it, holding it, doing the things he's supposed to do. With a year of work; he went to the Manning Academy and is doing a bunch of stuff. We're always being in search of being able to throw the ball effectively at Apopka and that hasn't changed. We're going to keep working at that, but he can do it."

Overall, Rolson said he really enjoys being around his players and that they are his main motivation on the field. He also had some comments on the high numbers of players transferring from school to school. Historically, the Apopka High football team loses a lot more players via the transfer than come to the team – a lot more.

"We've got a good core group, good athletes. I think we've got the pieces. We could be markedly better this year but with the transfer portal around here, you don't know what you're going to run into," Rolson said. "Teams just load up and they've got this guy and that guy. At the end of the day, when we get down to crunch time, our home-grown, tough-asnails group is going to be able to compete and beat most of those allstar groups

because they just have more heart."

Rolson elaborated on why the Blue Darters receive few players transferring to Apopka High.

"There are probably a couple of reasons. No. 1, we don't call people; we don't search for people. We do not recruit. I'm not saying other people do, but I'm saying it does not happen at Apopka. We ain't looking for kids. We coach what we got," the head coach said.

"At Apopka, you've got to wear a uniform that looks like everybody else. We're not about the swag and the drip. You're going to be a yes-sir, no-sir guy. You're going to be disciplined and we're going to be physical at practice.

Physicality, discipline, and being team guys – that's not for everybody, not for most. If that's not you, you can't play for us

"When we go out there, we're not going to have earrings on. We're not going to have chains or shields and all that. We go by the rules and we're going to play."

I cannot express how much I love the previous three paragraphs, and trust me, Rolson was somewhat emotional when he was talking about the Apopka High football program. He runs a great program and one of which all AHS alumni and the Apopka community can be proud.

Defensive lineman Lorenzo Payne talked to me for a couple of minutes about the summer work and the upcoming season.

"I'm ready for the season. I'm excited. I've been getting a lot stronger. I've been getting bigger. I've gotten a little bit taller, too. Speed, hands, footwork, everything I could work on," Lorenzo said.

"I'm going to continue to do my job in everything I'm coached up on and I want to finish correctly by winning state."

Last year, Lorenzo had a great season, but like Davison at QB, Lorenzo had probably his best game in the state championship contest as he had four tackles and two of Apopka's five sacks. He said that he's expecting big things

expected to improve from one season to the next. Most importantly for the Mustangs though, logic dictates that the number of plays with big impact should only increase as Davis progresses through a third season under center.

The rest of the starters at wide receiver are Anthony Gay (returning), Jamarian Robinson, and Michael Ellis. A combined total of 38 receptions, 590 yards, and 10 touchdowns return among the starting wide receivers.

Tyrea Fillius steps into the starting lineup after averaging 6.1 yards per carry on the ground as the second option last season.

Wekiva's choice of defensive scheme is the 4-3 or the more athletic version of the 4-2-5 with two high safeties.

Unlike the 4-3 formation, the sam or rover position (linebacker) in the 4-2-5 is called upon to cover in man, take on a pulling guard and rush the passer against a usually bigger offensive tackle. Several formations do not even assign a linebacker rover or sam responsibilities.

Creating pressure at the line of scrimmage by getting more players to the point of attack quicker than the offense is the cornerstone concept of the 4-2-5.

Speed and efficient movement between locations is accordingly the basic yet specific requirements under the umbrella of more athleticism for success. Also, unlike some defensive designs, redeploying personnel during the snap count and adjustment of coverage responsibilities while the play develops are also commonplace. Bigger linebackers take on the role of a defensive lineman. The bigger defensive backs take on the role of a linebacker.

Over the past two seasons, defensive lineman Sincere Edwards has been the face of the Mustangs' defense. Edwards was a starter as a freshman and has verbally committed to the Pittsburgh Panthers. Eighty-eight tackles and 16 sacks were recorded by Edwards last season. Last season also saw Edwards recovering two fumbles. Edwards lines up in all three defensive line positions and occasionally on offense as well.

A strong 1-2-3 punch from the defensive line is completed as well with the

return of Omar Hayes and Xavier Stephens while Anthony Rosier was added via transfer.

The entire rotation at the linebacker position will be new to the varsity team with transfer Tyrese Alexis and junior varsity call-up Jaylen Barnes earning starting roles.

Strong Safety Jabari Smith is the only member of the secondary returning. However, the experience of starting all 12 contests (including preseason) last season and as a freshman is also brought to the field by Smith. Employing a nickelback on every play and Jameer Tyson for Wekiva, within the design of the secondary's coverage is the main difference positionwise between the formations. Kalen Meadows as the free safety, Tykevis Davis as a cornerback and Greg Jones as the other cornerback move into starting roles with the secondary this season.

"Again, next overall step to be taken within the context of judging the 2023 season is obvious - winning during the playoffs," Schwartz said. "However, winning during the playoffs is the overall goal and the end result of the progress achieved before."

The Mustangs' character of everything but shying away from facing the best in the state continued during the spring practice game. Providing the opposition was the (Sanford) Seminole Seminoles.

"Expectation of Seminole forcing us to apply the progression achieved during the offseason toward winning was met," Schwartz said. "Most of what we wanted to gain from not just competing in a spring practice game but against the Seminoles was. We want to win every contest and time stepping onto the field, of course. Upping the level of play and staying competitive with a top-tier team for an entire contest was the priority though and achieved."

Seminole won by a final score of 28-21. However, only three quarters were played by the varsity teams. (Junior varsity played the fourth quarter).

"An offense doesn't put up 21 points in three quarters and the number improving compared to the previous season without the offensive line providing some solid blocking. If nothing else, compared to last season, the Mustangs' offensive line will be considerably deeper. Unlike last season we

also at least possess a couple of attributes which can compensate for skill level still developing (youth)."

Davis completed 13-of-27 passes for 207 yards and the two touchdowns.

"As much as Ty'Ray has improved and demonstrated tonight, more is possible," Schwartz said. "However, the emphasis is on the fine tuning of skills as opposed to developing the set. He has developed a skill set capable of making the big play when needed."

Six passes were caught by Bennett for a total of 122 yards.

"There was good," Schwartz said.
"There was bad, with discipline as the catalyst. However, far more good than bad. The foundation upon which a top-tier team is built on continues to strengthen."

Results were of the most tangible nature this summer as Wekiva competed in four 7-on-7 camps. The Mustangs even claimed the Florida High School 7 vs. 7 Association State Series and University of South Florida championships. Wekiva specifically contended for each of the camp's championships participating in, though.

"Albeit much less intense than regular season contests, the championships were as much about demonstrating the state of the program as the victories themselves," Schwartz said. "No exhibitions competed in as preparation for the 2021 season were won. Victory over the West Orange Warriors during the 2022 offseason was a strong positive sign and tangible improvement in comparison. Programs evolve into the top tier of competition and build on the signature victory most importantly."

"However, evolving into the top-tier of competition and building on the signature victory is exactly that, far from the end all be all. A signature victory is inconsequential if the evolution and building on doesn't follow. The effort the program needs to put in to evolve and build on after is no less than when chasing the signature victory. We have proceeded this offseason with the mindset of the first signature victory (over the Blue Darters) as the start, but far from completing the work of becoming a top tier competitor."

The 2023 regular season schedule is made up of the Olympia Titans (away-Aug. 25), Ocoee Knights (away-Sept. 1), Lake

Minneola Hawks (away-Sept 8), West Orange Warriors (home-Sept. 14), Lake Brantley Patriots (home-Sept. 22), Edgewater Eagles (away-Sept 29), Naples First Baptist Academy Lions (home-Oct. 6), Horizon Hawks (home-Oct. 13), Jones Tigers (away-Oct. 20) and Apopka Blue Darters (away-Nov. 3).

Wekiva, Edgewater, Horizon, and Jones make up District 3M-3.

Every Metro Classification is made up of four regions across the state. There are then four districts in each region. The champion of each district earns an automatic berth into the playoffs. Four other berths of a wild card nature fill out the playoff field in each region.

Priority in the seedings is not given to the four district champions. Wild cards and overall seedings are decided according to the FHSAA power rankings. Pairing of teams are according to highest and lowest remaining seeds. Based on the team's records, the opponents' records and the opponents' opponents' records, a specific mathematical formula is used to calculate the power rankings. For example, the Eagles claimed the District 3M-3 championship and number one seed for Class 3M-Region 2 last season. However, the number two seed was earned by Jones instead of another district champion. Thus, the rematch with the Mustangs as the number seven seed was set.


"When evaluating Wekiva alone, progress has been steady and solid throughout the offseason," Schwartz said. "How does the pace of the progress compare to opponents is the question though. Are we progressing as fast as opponents? Opponents are practicing and preparing for the upcoming season just like

"Our best being better than most teams in itself isn't enough to win the number of contests needed for a playoff berth. We have to develop a best at least equal to the top tier teams, the lesson learned last season. Last season we earned the playoff berth because the strength of the schedule was top-20 in the state. Including eight contests against playoff teams, the record last season was 5-5. This season's opponents are almost all the same. Then the one different opponent was a state champion."

from the defensive line and is looking forward to having teammate Kevin Roberts line up beside him.

Roberts spent most of last season on the sideline but did make appearances late in the playoffs. Teammates can expect to hear more from Lorenzo this season. "I see myself as one of the top leaders on the team," he said.

Ethan Korkes returns as the center on the offensive line for the Blue Darters. This summer, Korkes and other offensive linemen have been working hard in the weightroom and agility drills.

"We've been working a lot on explosiveness. We've been working on power clean, snatch, a lot of Olympic movements," he said. "The O-line specifically, we've been working to improve on our pass game. We've been grinding out there every morning working on our footwork, trying to get faster."

Korkes said he's expecting good things from the guys up front this season. "The offensive line, we need to focus more on keeping our heads up, being aware of what's going on," he said.

"We have a lot of returning players this year, Evan Ashford and Charvis Williams. They're both strong. They're coming out this summer and we've been hitting it hard. We're technically sound so as long as we keep it together and focus on what we're doing, I think we're going to do well."

He's also looking forward to greater things from the offense with quarterback Tyson Davison leading the way.

"I'm excited. Tyson is going to be something special. He's going into his sophomore year. In his freshman year, he took his team to the state championship," Ethan said.

"I love working with him. He's one of the best quarterbacks I've worked with."

Just before preseason practice officially started, the Blue Darters went for a weekend camp in Lake County with 63 players and several coaches making the trip.

The main idea for the camp, Rolson said, was to build team bonding, but also to work on installing part of the offense and defense that the Blue Darters will be running this season. Rolson said the goal on building camaraderie among the players and coaches was met.

"I think it was exactly what we hoped for," he said. "The kids had a great time. We competed in some stuff that was nonfootball and football. We played some paintball, did some tug-of-war, did some volleyball. We did a bunch of different stuff and the kids really had a great spirit, and had a great time. The food was good, and the fellowship time was good, so everything about it was spot-on. Everything about it was what we needed."

The players were divided up into several teams to compete with each other

in various sports and activities. Before the team left for the camp on July 28, they met at Apopka High School for a few hours of activities such as an obstacle course made up with such items as a football blocking chute, blocking bags, and track hurdles. Rolson said assistant coach Marcus Neeson was the idea guy behind many of the activities the players participated in over the weekend that lasted through midday on July 30.

Rolson said the idea for the camp came because he wasn't satisfied with the last Fellowship of Christian Athletes camp the team attended two years ago as not all of the teams attending have strong discipline in their programs and players getting together sometimes causes issues with other teams.

Plus, the football activities during FCA camps are not always done well, Rolson said.

"Not everybody manages their team well," he said. "Some people are out there thinking it's the Super Bowl. "I don't think you have to go scrimmage other teams and I don't want to deal with drama from other teams; I just want our guys to bond and I think we have a special group. We're going to have adversity this year, no doubt, but we've got a special group of guys, and I'm not talking about talent, I'm just talking about good young men. They're Darters and they love the program. They're going to give what they have. It's a good group."

While Apopka has high-level

competition from several other Orange County schools and the Blue Darters have always been a disciplined program that doesn't necessarily attract top talent from players who are looking to transfer to another school.

"Here, if you want discipline, you'll play here. If need to be your own dude, you're going somewhere else and there are plenty of opportunities at winning programs around here that they can depart to."

The Blue Darters will open the regular season on the road at Ocoee on August 25. The first home game of the season will be on September 1 when Apopka hosts long-time rival West Orange.

The Blue Darters hit the road again on September 8 with a contest at Dr. Phillips. After a week off for the Blue Darters, Edgewater comes to Apopka's Roger Williams Field on September 22.

District 4M-2 play for Apopka begins at Seminole on September 29. The road trip continues the following week as Apopka will play at Olympia on October 6. Lake Brantley visits Apopka on October 13 and Lake Mary follows on October 20. Both of those are District 4M-2 contests.

Evans will host the Blue Darters on October 26 in the only Thursday game of the season and then the regular season will close on November 3, as the Darters will host hometown rival Wekiva.



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
