Other topics that were covered during the conference were also very enlightening and helpful. Some of the ones I enjoyed the most were using Career and Technical Education in Exceptional Stu-

dent Education job development, keeping staff safe with aggressive student behaviors, embracing and elevating English Language Learners, recruiting, hiring and retaining staff members, late start times, the science of reading, and navigating book challenges.

All of these topics are relevant to the work I do every day on the school board, so I found all these sessions to be very infor-

mative and helpful.

As I approach another year on the board, I am excited at the potential of what lies ahead, and I'm hopeful that the upcoming legislative session will bring about many positive changes for our schools in this state.

I'm also thankful that I have an organization like FSBA to help prepare me with the knowledge and skills I need to be effective at my job.

Springs Baptist Church. As for encouraging civility and sociability, my Neighborhood Leader Program provides numerous opportunities for engaging in community events. The cities of Apopka and Ocoee as municipalities offer numerous community events, and I highly recommend that residents participate. The People of Lockhart recently offered a large-scale event in conjunction with their 150th anniversary.

Here is a checklist for neighborhood leaders to consider developing character or highly functioning neighborhoods. One – establish or strengthen the existing neighborhood organization or create a new voluntary association. Two – provide a beautification plan or spirit decorating plan to better engage resident volunteers. Three – establish and utilize an internal communication

system and use it regularly. Four – fully engage and partner as a neighborhood team with your municipal government.

Critical elements for creating and maintaining great neighborhoods include: a safe environment with low crime rates. Trees and beauty are a must. Neighborhoods should be located by nearby amenities such as parks, quality schools, gathering places, civic and religious institutions, shopping, dining, and local businesses. Citizens must insist on quality public services such as police, fire, parks and recreation, utilities, and public works. In this environment, municipalities are being forced to spend more on employment packages to attract the best and brightest into public service.

And the final suggestion from my source, Bill Kercher's series on "Character Towns, Neighborhoods etc" is "walkable, pretty streets". I spend sig-

Apopka would start to catch back up to Lake Brantley in the third quarter, going into the fourth down 36-20, scoring more points in the third than they did the first half of the game. Apopka started to put out the Lake Brantley fire and control the damage with steals and forced turnovers. Apopka also stuck with a higher percentage of looks in the third quarter staying away from volume threepoint shooting and looking more towards the inside. Even with this, Apopka went 2-for-2 from the three-point line in the third quarter which helped them cut down the deficit.

Apopka went 3-for-11 from the field in the third quarter with half of their points coming from the free throw line. Turnovers were still a problem in the third with Apopka giving away the ball eight times, but Jermichael Johnson had a great quarter with eight points, a block, and a few offensive rebounds.

The fourth quarter start-

ed great with Apopka going on an 8-5 run on Lake Brantley, putting them behind at 41-28 with 4:57 left in the final quarter. Apopka fought hard until the last possession to get back into it, but could not overcome the deficit in the end.

The game ended with Apopka behind 52-43. Apopka's loss was caused by inefficiency and turnovers, and in the end, just a few mistakes would cost them the win.

Coach Williams said, "We were very inefficient,

and turnovers were a problem. It's subtle, but we had some defensive lapses, little things, and we didn't do a very good job in terms of recognizing their personnel. And in a game that turns out to be a nine-point game, we need to do better with the little details."

Jermichael Johnson was the shining light of the game with 25 points, five steals, one block, two assists, and nine rebounds on 64.2 shooting percentage. Coach Williams said Daren Leath is the leader of the team, but Johnson is the emotional kick starter or energy guy on the court.

"Daren is our unquestioned leader. My hope for

Daren is, on nights when maybe he struggles a little bit offensively, that he can continue being assertive... But, you know, Jermichael is a life force on his own. He's relentless, and that was very evident obviously in the second half. He had a lot of help, but I think he was the guy that kind of set the tone for the momentum

What I saw in the final quarter of that game was a need to win. A need to come back and fix the mistakes made earlier in the game. I think, with that mentality, Apopka has the ability to bounce back from anything, and they showed that, even down a huge deficit, they

can play at an elite level to bring the game back into reach in a very short amount of time.

"I was extremely pleased with the courage we showed in the second half. A lot of teams just go ahead and get beat by 28 and call it a bad day. And these guys just aren't wired like that. And that's been the norm here. It wasn't the norm last year, and we are really trying to establish our identity as a team that's going to be really tough, and is going to fight, and is going to dig in. And so I'm super pleased by that," Coach Williams said after the game.


