A primary election is held 11 weeks before the general election.


The General Election is on Tuesday, Nov. 5. This election is open to all voters regardless of party affiliation.

to the field of competition. A lot of athletic scholarships have been offered to many of the athletes I have coached. There are just as many athletes who have gone onto successful careers in professional fields though. The athletes went on to earn college degrees, then made a successful career by continuing to carry the work ethic throughout their lives."

McMillian has also served as a part of Apopka High School wrestling's staff for over two decades.

Diversity is the hall-mark of the careers chosen by the athletes coached by McMillian. McMillian listed police officer, firefighter, and serving in the military as a few of the career paths athletes that he once coached have taken. Careers without the structural ranks include education, law, and journalism.

Working the way up the ladder of success one rung at a time, but steadily in the chosen profession is the common factor among the careers chosen though.

Wrestling will always be thought of first and foremost when discussing Mc-Millian's coaching career. The award is also specifically for the sport of wrestling. Nonetheless, McMillian influence has been in all sports.
