Art and foliage have a history grown in Apopka's soil

The Apopka Art and Foliage Festival has a rich history.

In 1961, under the leadership of, then President Kit Land Nelson, the Apopka Woman's Club hosted its first art show at Apopka Memorial High School. The tradition continued and the show became an annual event. Then, in 1965, the Apopka Jaycees hosted the first Apopka Foliage Festival at the corner of Forest Avenue and Fourth Street. The festival soon gained wide-spread attention throughout Central Florida. The two events combined in 1976 to become the Apopka Art and Foliage Festival.

The festival is held annually at Kit Land Nelson Park and has helped to bring recognition to the unique cultural aspects of the city of Apopka and its significant contribution to the national indoor foliage industry.

The Apopka Art and Foliage

Festival has been attended by governors and other dignitaries and has received many accolades. Among them are:

*In 1982 was central to the city's Centennial Celebration. *In 1984 was showcased in Southern Living Magazine.

*In 2000 was designated as National Local Legacy by the Library of Congress.

*In 2002 celebrated Apopka's 120th anniversary as a city.

*In 2003 was recognized in "The Apopka Spirit" in *Florida Living* magazine.

The festival has grown into one of the most respected and well-attended festivals in Central Florida, showcasing fine arts and distinctive highquality foliage.

Green's Nursery is the number one distributor for the encore azalea. These azaleas bloom three to four times a year spring, summer, and fall, and can be planted in full sun. There are 23 varieties of these azaleas and some of these will be at the festival.

Ray purchased 10 acres of land north of Zellwood while serving 20 years in the U.S. Marines. He settled on the land in January 1978 and started by trucking for one of the local nurseries. Wanting to make use of his land, he began by growing azaleas and developing his own nursery stock. Green currently maintains approximately 15 acres with a variety of trees, shrubs, tropicals, and fruit and nut trees, along with bedding plants and indoor foliage.

Ray started participating in the Apopka Woman's Club Apopka Art and Foliage Festival in 1985. He enjoys finding and having items that are not common. He strives to carry a large variety of plants to meet the needs of landscapers, retail stores, and general customers. If you need something and can't find what you want, Green's got it or he can find it for you.

Ray will have his large amount of various great plants and will be bringing back the popular Yesterday Today Tomorrow plant again this year. He will also have all sizes of bamboo this year.

15th year in the festival

Just Plumerias specializes in growing the plumeria. The plumeria is the plant that produces the flowers that make the leis in Hawaii. We have been growing the plumeria for 16 years and have been a participant with Disney by exhibiting at the Epcot Flower and Garden Festival over the past nine years. We are also a vendor at the Winter Park Farmers Market.

We think the plumeria is one of the most beautiful flowers in the world, and we consider the plumeria one of the most perfect plants in the world because of the following characteristics. The plumeria looks fantastic and it blooms from April through November. The flower does not last that long, but the bloom pod continuously keeps blooming for most of the year. The plumeria smells like no other plant in the world and each color has its own unique fragrance. Some plumerias smell sweet, while another color can smell like jasmine, peaches, or citrus.

The plumeria can be grown anywhere in the world since it can either be a 20-foot tree if you live in the warmer climates, or it makes a fantastic potted plant for your patio deck, screen pool, balcony or driveway. The plumeria only grows to the size of the pot. In climates where it freezes, you can either bring the plumeria inside to keep it growing in the winter, or you can put it in the closet or basement and it will go into a dormant state. Bring the plumeria out when it warms up next spring, and it blooms bigger than the year before. The plumeria is one of the most no maintenance plants in the world. It is drought tolerant and can be grown in full sun or partial sun.

Long & Scott Farms is a fourth-generation family farm just west of Zellwood. In 1963, Frank D. Scott Jr. left his Virginia family farm with his wife, Becky, and three small children to start his own farm. He was encouraged by Billy Long, a successful muck farmer in Zellwood, who was also his childhood friend and neighbor from the eastern shore of Virginia. Frank began by clearing 100

acres of sand land to grow vegetables and expanded to 1,200 acres over the years. Long & Scott is now run by Frank's

son Hank (Frank III) with his son Sonny (Frank IV) who handles all the land prep prior to planting. Hank's daughter Haley Scott operates the Farmers Market and Café, and sister Rebecca Scott Tyndall manages the corn maze and agri-tainment on the farm. Frank's other son Marks Scott and his wife Mary own and operate Plowboys Horticulture, a wholesale foliage nursery also in Zellwood, growing indoor plants.

Pickle (Kirby) cucumbers are our main crop at the farm. Each year, we harvest 1,200 acres of cucumbers between the spring and fall seasons, along with 90 acres of the world-famous Scott's Zellwood Sweet Corn. In the cooler winter season, 450 acres of red, green, and savoy cabbage are produced, along with strawberries, collards, kale, and Florida sweet onions

Long & Scott is celebrating 54 plus years of quality vegetable production, and we are proud of our history and the many employees, vendors, customers, and ag groups that have supported us over the years. We are very blessed and thankful for the resources of land and water, and we are good stewards of our land and water, protecting them for the next generation





Seminole Springs Herb Farm in Eustis is the joint endeavor of Traci and Keith Anderson along with their two sons, Kyle and Logan. Traci took over the growing of herbs from a previous nursery and the couple relocated the farm to its present location in Eustis in 1994. Their nursery has supplied numerous nurseries, garden centers, and grocery stores with potted herb plants for some 20 years now. In 2004, they expanded the nursery from its original size to more than 20,000 square feet of covered greenhouse devoted totally to a wide variety of herbs from around the world. The new millennium embraced the addition of antique or old garden roses that complement the herbs. Antique roses are the predecessor of the modern rose, and are typically defined by those roses that have been in production prior to 1869. Of course, having survived and being shared for so long one can easily deduce that they are easy to grow. The famed fortuniana rootstock that plays such an important part in rose production

today is in fact an old garden rose. Traci, a native Floridian from Sanford, is well versed in the specifics of growing plants in Florida's unique subtropical climate. Her knowledge stems from hands on experience, having grown herbs commercially for more than 20 years in Florida. A regular speaker for garden clubs, churches, schoolsm and the University of Florida, Traci's program "Introduction to Herbs" covers the ins and outs of growing herbs in our area. Traci introduces attendees to a wide assortment of culinary, medicinal and aromatic herbs and discusses their culture, history and uses. 

Everitt Spruill will judge at festivel

An American painter, photographer, and printmaker. Born in Birmingham, Alabama USA. Everett Spruill attended Berea College, where he earned a Business Degree. It was during this time that he painted small landscapes and portraits in the tradition of the French Impressionist but did not seriously entertain the idea of a career in the arts. While managing a Hotel in Miami, and with frequent visits to the Miami Museum, a Picasso exhibition changed his outlook as he was inspired by the simplicity and geometric patterns that formed the images. After relocating to Orlando, Spruill took up painting seriously and it was at this time that he created the "Old School Jazz and Blues" series of paintings and collages, inspired by the art of Romare Bearden. From that time on Spruill consistently created increasingly complex variations of art from recycled and re-purposed materials focusing on Jazz as a central theme. Spruill constantly challenges himself to source new materials and expand his resources. His first radical shift came in 1999, with the "Tribal Rhythms Series" in which he employs interlocking geometric shapes combined with graffiti techniques. It was around this time as well that he created his first prints in screen printing, linoleum cuts, and offset lithography. During the following decade, Spruill introduced texture into his art, which he came to call "Nuvo-stained glass" for its transparent qualities. From the mid-1990s to 2010, Spruill created a large body of work that responded in a general way to the childlike simplicity of creating art. During this time, the increasingly abstract

collages of Spruill's paintings gave way to a multitude of materials from electronic components, textiles, recycled wallpaper, and decorative architectural elements. To create these works, the artist uses appropriated materials and digital technologies.

In 2017, Spruill began making wire sculptures for public spaces and developing architectural projects. Still residing in Orlando Florida with his many accolades, Everett Spruill prints and paintings are most famous for his work in the areas of collage and cubist abstraction.

Spruill's work is in public and private collections worldwide, including The Amway Center, Disney Springs and Epcot Center, The City of Orlando and The Media Institute to name a few.
