Dear friends and visitors,

Welcome to the 63rd annual Apopka Art & Foliage Festival. The festival is sponsored by the GFWC Apopka Woman's Club in partnership with the City of Apopka. Our thanks to Mayor Bryan Nelson and the dedicated city workers who help us bring this festival to you. Thanks to all our sponsors and The Apopka Chief newspaper.

Let's take a stroll through the park together: After parking in Edwards Field, the foliage area is calling. On display is everything from roses to our "spotlight" plant, Anasas Sugar Loaf pineapple, which is edible.

After you purchase all your plants, the plant sitter booth will "baby sit" them for a small fee so you can continue your adventure. We also have knowledgeable "plant doctors" who can answer your questions about problems you may have in your yard or garden. This leads us to the conservation area, where you can become familiar with native birds, animals, the ecosystem and more. There will also be 200 bald cypress trees given away starting Saturday morning on a first come first served basis. As always, only one per person. Bordering conservation is school art where local students display their creative talents. Some of their work will really "WOW" you.

Also, on this side of the park we will have a face painter and the "hamster wheel" where kids can create their own snow cones by running in the hamster wheel.

Now we walk through the creative craft displays of everything from pottery, jewelry, leather, wood work, books, soaps, and much more. Next, is fine art and fine handcrafts. Amazing pieces from fine artists that will be sure to catch your eye. At the back of the park is concession row where you will have a choice of many different foods and drinks. Picnic tables and tents are available for you to relax, or in the middle of the park is the gazebo with entertainment all day. Chairs and bleachers are under the large trees so you can rest and be entertained by local artists and area schools.

The Kids Zone is sponsored by Home Depot. There will be a craft for the kids to put together and take home. The Apopka police and fire departments will also be on hand with police vehicles and fire trucks for the kids to explore.

As you can see, it will be a fun-filled day at the Apopka Art & Foliage Festival. All proceeds from the festival will go back to the community in the form of scholarships to local high school seniors, area nonprofits, local sports teams as well as the city fire, police and recreation departments.

My deepest gratitude to the members of the Apopka Woman's Club who work year-round to bring this festival to fruition. If you have any questions or concerns, look for the "green shirt ladies" to help you. We will be out and about everywhere.

The Art & Foliage Festival's spotlight plant this year is the Ananas comosus, a pineapple variety known as Sugarloaf. Part of the family of Bromeliaceae, pineapples are tropical plants native to South America. The fruit was first introduced in Europe in the 1600s and has been produced in multiple tropical plantations and in greenhouses for commercial use since the early 19th century. Compared to other pineapple varieties, the sugarloaf has a white flesh that is less fibrous and acidic and has higher sugar content. The sugarloaf can weigh on average 5 to 6 pounds.

The Apopka Art & Foliage Festival has a rich history

In 1961, under the leadership of then-President Kit Land Nelson, the Apopka Woman's Club hosted its first art show at Apopka Memorial High School. The tradition continued, and the show became an annual event.

In 1965, the Apopka Jaycees hosted the first Apopka Foliage Festival at the corner of Forest Avenue and Fourth Street. The festival soon gained widespread attention throughout Central Florida. The two events combined in 1976 to become the Apopka Art and Foliage Festival.

Over the decades, the Apopka Art and Foliage Festival has blossomed into one of the most respected and well-attended festivals in Central Florida, showcasing fine arts and distinctive high-quality foliage. Held annually at Kit Land Nelson Park, the festival helped to bring recognition to the unique cultural aspects of the city of Apopka and its significant contribution to the national indoor foliage industry.

Governors and other dignitaries have attended the festival, and the event has received many accolades. Among them are:

*Being central to the city's Centennial Celebration in 1982.


*Being showcased in Southern Living Magazine in 1984.

Green's Nursery is the number one distributor for the encore azalea. These azaleas bloom three to four times a year — spring, summer, and fall, and can be planted in full sun. There are 23 varieties of these azaleas and some of these will be at the festival.

Ray purchased 10 acres of land north of Zellwood while serving 20 years in the U.S. Marines. He settled on the land in January 1978 and started by trucking for one of the local nurseries. Wanting to make use of his land, he began by growing azaleas and developing his own nursery stock. Green currently maintains approximately 15 acres with a variety of trees, shrubs, tropicals, and fruit and nut trees, along with bedding plants and indoor foliage.

Ray started participating in the Apopka Woman's Club Apopka Art and Foliage Festival in 1985. He enjoys finding and having items that are not common. He strives to carry a large variety of plants to meet the needs of landscapers, retail stores and general customers. If you need something and can't find what you want, Green's got it or he can find it for you.

Ray will have his large amount of various great plants and will be bringing back the popular Yesterday Today Tomorrow plant again this year. He will also have all sizes of bamboo this year.

JUST PLUMERIAS

Scott and Jeanette Burford, owners-growers 160 South Phelps Ave. Winter Park, 32789 407-756-2628 17th year in the festival Just Plumerias specializes in growing the plumeria. The plumeria is the plant that produces the flowers that make the leis in Hawaii. We have been growing the plumerie for 16 years and

growing the plumeria for 16 years and have been a participant with Disney by exhibiting at the Epcot Flower and Garden Festival for almost a decade. We are also a vendor at the Winter Park Farmers Market.

We think the plumeria is one of the most beautiful flowers in the world. We consider the plumeria one of the most perfect plants in the world because of the following characteristics. The plumeria looks fantastic and it blooms from April through November. The flower does not last that long, but the bloom pod continuously keeps blooming for most of the year. The plumeria smells like no other plant in the world, and each color has its own unique fragrance. Some plumerias smell sweet, while another color can smell like jasmine, peaches or citrus.

The plumeria can be grown anywhere in the world since it can either be

a 20-foot tree if you live in the warmer climates, or it makes a fantastic potted plant for your patio deck, screen pool, balcony or driveway. The plumeria only grows to the size of the pot. In climates where it freezes, you can either bring the plumeria inside to keep it growing in the winter, or you can put it in the closet or basement and it will go into a dormant state. Bring the plumeria out when it warms up next spring, and it blooms bigger than the year before. The plumeria is one of the most no-maintenance plants in the world. It is drought tolerant and can be grown in full sun or partial sun.

Eustis is the joint endeavor of Traci and Keith Anderson along with their two sons, Kyle and Logan. Traci took over the growing of herbs from a previous nursery, and the couple relocated the farm to its present location in Eustis in 1994. Their nursery has supplied numerous nurseries, garden centers and grocery stores with potted herb plants for some 20 years now.

In 2004, they expanded the nursery from its original size to more than 20,000 square feet of covered greenhouse devoted totally to a wide variety of herbs from around the world. The new millennium embraced the addition of antique or old garden roses that complement the herbs. As the predecessor of the modern rose, antique roses are typically defined by those roses that have been in production prior to 1869. Of course, having survived and being shared for so long one can easily deduce that they are easy to grow. The famed fortuniana rootstock that plays such an important part in rose production today is in fact an old garden rose.

Traci, a native Floridian from Sanford, is well-versed in the specifics of growing plants in Florida's unique subtropical climate. Her knowledge stems from hands-on experience, having grown herbs commercially for more than 20 years in the state. A regular speaker for garden clubs, churches, schools and the University of Florida, Traci's program "Introduction to Herbs" covers the ins and outs of growing herbs in our area. Traci introduces attendees to a wide assortment of culinary, medicinal and aromatic herbs and discusses their culture, history and uses. Her program includes planting, seasonal herbs, pests, diseases, remedies, recipes

and how to maintain them organically.

In October 2012, Traci accepted a position with the city of Tavares as its landscape specialist. She still oversees the general practices of the Herb Farm. However, Kyle, the eldest of two sons, has taken over the tasks in growing and maintaining the farm along with a small staff. Kyle has grown up with the farm as a huge part of his daily life, and the Andersons are proud to see him as the ambassador for the Herb Farm at present.




