City Council votes unanimously to extend funding to continue Border Lake pumping

Nesta questions if homeowners are aware of extension

The Apopka City Council on Wednesday approved funds to continue the pumping project at Border Lake through the end of August.

The council voted 5–0 to provide money to continue renting equipment used in the pumping. However, one council member raised questions about whether homeowners

were made aware that the city intends to keep pumping.

Continued rental of the pumping equipment until Aug. 31, the last date of the project's authorization period, would ensure its availability in case bad weather jeopardizes its progress, public works director/city engineer Vladimir Simonovski said in his overview of the Border Lake pumping plan at the City Council meeting.

If the rental company took out the pumps, the equipment would be hard to set up again and finish pumping by Aug.

Apopka Office Supply to close after 54 years in business

Apopka Office Supply (AOS) will close its doors on Aug. 15, ending its 54-year run in the heart of Apopka.

AOS originally opened in 1971, almost a decade before the Ricketson family would purchase AOS, The Apopka Chief and The Planter. AOS operated alongside the newspapers for its entire existence.

"Apopka Office Supply has been a steady, helpful presence in the community for more than half a century," said J.C. Derrick, publisher of The Apopka Chief. "The marketplace has changed a lot over the years, so we decided it made sense to end AOS operations as a separate entity and bring them under the Chief umbrella."

City explores how to make Camp Wewa viable

Budget set to increase 19% in **FY26**

The city of Apopka is considering a 19% increase — equivalent to just north of \$1 million — to the Camp Wewa budget in an effort to make the struggling facility financially viable.

At a workshop this week, city officials discussed how to not only make Camp Wewa break even financially, but to also market it so it could be more prof-

itable.

Radley Williams, parks and recreation director and interim city administrator,

brought the budget request of about \$14.3 million to the city's July 7 workshop, the first of three straight days of budget meetings.

Since the city purchased the camp for \$4.7 million from the YMCA of Central Florida in 2021, officials expected the city to turn the faltering campsite around and recoup the money.

However, in spite of offering many services, including summer camp, school-year programs and retreat space for organizations, Camp Wewa was unable to break even. Ac-

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Billboards and mailers meant to spark discussion

To The Apopka Chief:

Allow me to extend my sincerest gratitude to everyone who has reached out, and to those who noticed the recent mailer and billboard. The phrase "Make Apopka Great Again" was chosen not for partisan politics, but because it would spark conversation and capture attention, which was indeed the goal. To clarify, the objective of the mailer and billboard was never intended as a personal attack on Mayor Bryan Nelson or Commissioner Christine Moore, but rather to highlight that our primary options are, in fact, career politicians.

The hope was to inspire reflection among residents, neighbors, taxpayers, business owners, and community members about the current state of Apopka and the critical leadership decisions ahead. To me, the position of mayor should be grounded in sound judgment and a balanced, proresident, business-focused approach, beyond politics, personality, or prior

The truth is, Apopka stands at a crossroads. Mayor Nelson, for better or worse, has a record at this point, and Commissioner Moore brings her own record of public service. There is legitimate concern, however, that she is seeking a third political office because she is term-limited on the Board of County Commissioners for Orange County; other residents express concerns about her penchant for staged photo ops.

Both candidates deserve serious consideration, but at the same time it is entirely fair for taxpayers to ask if we might benefit from a more robust discussion — and perhaps, a strong third option. Healthy civic debate is, in my view, the cornerstone of good governance.

A further concern is that, after qualifying, voters could be completely disenfranchised if Christine Moore's residency under Section 4.03 of the Apopka Municipal Code is successfully challenged,3 something we

know Mayor Nelson is keenly aware of, which could result in him winning by default. This is an outcome none of us should want.

The response I have received thus far has been greater than expected, and admittedly, some of the rumors have been entertaining. For the record, I am not a plant for Mayor Nelson, nor an attorney for [now withdrawn candidate] Mr. William Dabbs, or anyone

I am simply a father, homeowner, business owner, and taxpayer who loves this city dearly and wants to see it thrive. I believe Apopka needs humble leadership: someone who truly listens, and is committed to building a high-performing, independent team that is not beholden to ANY special interests or developer donations. That is a standard we should all strive for, regardless of who ends up serving.

I have not made a personal decision regarding running for office, though I am well aware of the personal and financial sacrifice serving with integrity requires. Leading during challenging times will require: thoughtful leadership, consensus building, sweat equity, and the thick skin to ensure the right decisions are made for Apopkans.

The reality is that the City of Apopka, in its current state, will take years to fully turn around. My hope is that this conversation will inspire a strong candidate, encourage thorough scrutiny of all current candidates, and perhaps foster the emergence of a worthwhile third option for our city and voters to consider.

Ultimately, our next mayor, whoever that may be, should be committed to transparency, independence, and the well-being of all Apopka residents. Thank you for joining this important conversation. I look forward to continuing this discussion with you, respectfully and with a shared vision for the very best future for Apopka.

City of Apopka prioritizes reserves, paying down debt

As we reflect back on the financial history of Apopka, it's important to know how hard our staff has worked to eliminate debt and increase reserves to put Apopka in a much stronger financial position.

In 2018, when I first got elected, we had \$10,184,693 in unassigned reserves, which is the "savings account" for whatever could go wrong. This could be a catastrophic infrastructure failure or a hurricane on the expenditure side, or it could be a recession that causes our sales tax, property tax and/or other fee income to plummet leaving the city to make up the shortfall.

Having served in the state Legislature through the recession of 2008– 2010, I saw first-hand what having a healthy reserve could do to smooth out a downturn in our economy. At the state level, we burned through over \$5 billion in reserves but still had to cut staff and services because we had to make sure that we could make it through the recession without any long-term harm to the state's

As of the end of the fiscal year

ending Sept. 30, 2024, I am proud to announce that we have \$42,051,600 in unassigned reserves, which is a 313% increase since 2018.

I would personally like to thank state Rep. Doug Bankson, our former city commissioner, for putting in place an ordinance requiring a 25% reserve requirement as a minimum that we have exceeded ever since.

We are just as excited about chipping away at the general fund debts that I assumed since becoming mayor. In 2018, we had 15 outstanding loans totaling \$13,860,319 in principal and over \$3 million in debt service. By the end of fiscal year 2025, we will have eliminated over \$13 million of debt and have reduced our

debt service by 75%. What an accomplishment!

What has changed in the accounting world is the GASB87 which reclassifies long-term leases into debt for accounting purposes. The two leases we have that are classified under the GASB87 are the AXON and Stryker leases, which cover our body cameras, tasers, stretchers, monitoring devices and other police and fire

These two leases cost the city just north of \$1.5 million dollars a year but are the preferred way of keeping up with new technology as it evolves and keeping the city on the

I have also reduced our internal rate of return on our police, fire and general employee pension funds from 7.25% to 6.95%, which costs the city more money short term but will make sure that our pension guarantee is more secure for our city retirees.

When we are putting together the city budgets at the staff level, I always ask staff if this were your money, would you spend in the same way. If there is any hesitation, we don't do it.

Financial Empowerment Center making impact for Apopkans

I'm excited to announce the county's program that provides free, one-on-one financial counseling to anyone who lives or works in Orange County.

The Bottom of Form Financial Empowerment Center (FEC) initiative has already helped hundreds of people take control of their finances. Now we have expanded where we are offering the counseling, and one location is in Apopka.

In the first six months, 290 clients have been served, collectively increasing their savings by more than \$93,000 and reducing total nonmortgage debt by nearly \$200,000. With plans to expand further, Orange County, in partnership with Habitat for Humanity Greater Orlando and Osceola County, aims to build on that momentum and reach even more community members in need of financial guidance.

"With locations across Orange County in tandem with virtual appointments, we're meeting people where they are," said Beyra Pavon-Molina, Program Manager of the FEC. "Whether someone lives in East or West Orange County, works downtown or prefers to connect from **County Commissioner** District 2



home, it's now easier than ever to take that first step toward financial stability."

The five Financial Empowerment Centers currently open across Orange County include: 1.John Bridges Community Cen-

ter — Apopka

2.Hal P. Marston Community Center — Orlando

3.Pine Hills Community Center — Orlando

4.East Orange Community Center — Orlando

5.Oak Ridge Neighborhood Center for Families — Orlando

Each session is led by a professional financial counselor trained to provide personalized guidance

"Our goal is to remove barriers," said Pavon-Molina. "Some people simply don't have time to commute to an office, so we bring that office

"We want people to know this a safe space," said Pavon-Molina. "We're here to empower individuals to set realistic goals and take control of their financial future, but there's still work to do. We want everyone who could benefit from our services to know we're here — and ready to help."

With its expanding footprint and also the opportunity to make an appointment for a virtual session, the Financial Empowerment Center is positioned to reach more residents than ever before, helping build a stronger, more financially resilient community.

Chief staff will continue to provide light copying, scanning, notary and printing services, which comprise most of the current AOS business activity.

Until Aug. 15, remaining AOS inventory — including pens, sticky notes, greeting cards and other products will be sold at 50% off list price.

"It's like a combined going-out-of-business and back-to-school sale," Derrick said. "We don't have a lot of inventory left, but we're happy to put what's there to good use."

When the Ricketsons purchased AOS45 years ago, it was approximately triple its current size and had an entrance separate from that of the newspaper.

"It was an old building built in 1945-46 in two pieces," AOS store manager Eileen Ricketson said. "The newspaper was on one side, and we were in the second part. Our address was 439 for the newspaper and 437 for the office supply store."

In the 1980s and '90s heyday of AOS, customers would arrive in a steady stream, Ricketson said. Two clerks would help behind the counter, while two salespeople would make phone calls and sales visits around town.

"We were always busy doing things that we needed to do on the inside, as well as being able to help people," Ricketson said. "If we couldn't help them, we tried to guide them to somebody that could."

Ricketson's tenure as store manager brought her

"Originally, AOS was a larger community supplier that had in-store customers and a healthy business delivery," Ricketson said. "As the larger wholesalers were able to buy the smaller wholesalers, the marketplace changed. It became easier and easier for the local business clientele to receive needed supplies at a lower cost."

Fewer customers also meant AOS did not need such a large space. After selling its property to Wawa (449 W. Main St.), the Chief and AOS moved to its present location (400 N. Park Ave.) on Sept. 16, 2012. By that time, AOS was facing other competitors — online shopping.

"Being able to order and get it delivered has become more important than going out and being in the marketplace," Ricketson said. "You can get whatever you want, and it's delivered to you in a day."

As AOS employees left, the store no longer needed to replace them. AOS now has no full-time employees, with staff from the Chief helping the customers that do come in with copying, faxing and more.

"The young people do not need it," she said. "That's the biggest difference — the marketplace keeps changing."

Even after the Chief changed ownership in February, Ricketson has stayed for the love of her job. A few customers walk in every week, asking to see the lady who always helps them, and they chat about days gone

Although Ricketson credits God for the gift of

adapting well and quickly, her decision to leave has not been an easy one.

"I loved my regulars, and they loved me," Ricketson said. "I liked what I did, so when you no longer are needed, either you retire or the marketplace retires. So that's basically where we are. It's time to go."

Derrick said he wishes Ricketson well as she chooses to embark on her next stage of life.

"Eileen is and always will be an Apopka treasure," Derrick said. "As we close the book on AOS as a standalone entity, I'm reminded of a Dr. Seuss quote: 'Don't cry because it's over. Smile because it happened."

CRA Board holds off purchase of \$299K Sixth Street property

Vacant parcel is close to other cityowned real estate

The Apopka Community Redevelopment Agency Board (CRA) voted unanimously Wednesday to table the decision to acquire a property valued at \$299,000 until the new economic development director takes a look at

The property in question is an estimated 0.42-acre, vacant property located at 161 E. 6th St., only two blocks south of Main Street/U.S. Hwy 442 and one block east of Park Avenue. The tract is adjacent to other city-owned real estate such as City Hall, Fire Station No. 1, and the Apopka Muse-

In an email included in

the CRA meeting agenda packet, W. Lee Barnes, broker associate for Orlando firm Maury L. Carter & Associates, reached out to Bobby Howell, interim CRA director, to ask if the city had any interest in the listed property.

"The site is centrally located and provides walkability to area retail, entertainment and services," a Maury L. Carter and Associates marketing brochure stated. "Great location for commerical [sic] uses including office, retail and also residential uses."

CRA member John Drago suggested that the CRA Board holds off on its decision to acquire the parcel until the city's new economic development director, Antranette Forbes, evaluates it. The City Council approved Forbes' appointment early this month. She begins her new position Aug. 4.

"The city just hired an economic development director, and I looked at her resume," said CRA member John Drago. "So I think, to be fair to the CRA and to give the new person an opportunity to get her feet on the ground, get acclimated with the community, get acclimated with the procedures, get acclimated with staff, she should be given the opportunity to evaluate this property to determine its functional use in the future, and she can come back at a later date with her recommendation."

The broker did not attend the CRA Board meeting.

"Given the information we have, we don't have enough information, and I find it odd that the realtor is not here to answer the questions," Drago said. "I don't know anything about this realtor. I don't know if he just sells property, or is he a developer, real estate person? I don't know that, but I don't think he should think that the CRA is the cash cow."

If the vote to acquire the property had passed, money would have come from CRA funds, according to the CRA staff report.

The city's Community Redevelopment Agency District is comprised of 633 acres in downtown Apopka and has a blend of residences, businesses and historic properties. The area is bound on the south by 10th and 11th streets, Hawthorne Avenue to the west, Oak Street to the north, and sections of multiple streets to the east, including Highland Avenue, Monroe Avenue and Alabama Avenue.

The CRA Board is made up of all members of the City Council and two other appointed board members.

Board member Nick Nesta emphasized the need for a plan if the property is purchased, including a timeline for improvements.

"It's been listed for a while, and we do need to expand our museum and have actually formalized parking versus kind of the dirt parking lot they have now," Nesta said. "At the same time, though, I want to make sure that we just have a plan in place. If we are going to purchase it, do we have a timeline and a runway of when are we going to actually fund the improvements that we may be doing? Are we just going to buy it and conserve it just the way that it is and just keep it as tree lot there? So if we're going to purchase it, let's have a plan in place."

Howell said tree bank contributions would be needed if the property is acquired.

31. The city also would have to fund the mobilization and set up costs again, Simonovski said.

The Border Lake temporary flood mitigation plan began June 26 and has been progressing well, meeting engineering projections, according to the presentation.

The city, which is trying to reduce the water levels in area lakes by a foot, expects to meet target levels in all affected lakes because of the pumping project. Without extending the funding for equipment rental, the project would have expended all the current funds that the City Council ap-

proved by budget amendment last March.

The city has additional funds amounting to \$25,784 from its stormwater fund to finish the first pumping phase, Simonovski said.

Council and city staff discussed whether homeowners were truly aware that the pumping project's timeframe is being extended.

Commissioner Nick Nesta brought up what he called inconsistencies on the June rightof-entry forms versus the paperwork homeowners signed last March. Comparing the two sets of documents, Nesta pointed out differences in driver's license details, home addresses and proper names.

Mayor Bryan Nelson said the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) accepted the updated forms despite their incompleteness.

Nesta said he wanted to ensure that residents were aware of the extension and the papers' validity.

"I just want to make sure that they truly are the ones that signed these," Nesta said. "So that's my questioning, and that's why I'm asking it. I want to make sure our residents are informed."

The inconsistencies between the March and June documents stemmed in part from the city collecting signatures not only from the home renters, but also the homeowners themselves. The SJRWMD directed the city to get both types of signatures, Simonovski and Nelson said.

When Nesta asked if the homeowners would be aware that the pumping project would be extended until the last date of August, Nelson said he didn't know. Simonovski said he didn't have paperwork details from March, but he did have the ones from June.

Nelson said that SJRW-MD's approval "is the only one that matters" in greenlighting the Border Lake pumping project, adding that the District was the one that informed the city about obtaining the rightof-entry forms.

Nesta made the first motion for the Council to take action on the pumping extension.

"I just want to say, before I motion, that I will agree to this with the understanding that these [forms] are accurate and true," Nesta said. "That's the only thing I have to go on, is that the residents know what you provided they know that we are extending this."

Over the years, homeowners have expressed frustration over the city's handling of flooding among the chain of lakes — which Border Lake is a part of — in the Piedmont-Wekiwa Road/S.R. 436 area.

The chain of lakes in the Piedmont-Wekiwa Road/S.R. 436 area has been prone to flooding over the years.

In October 2024, the Hurricane Milton aftermath caused flooding and other problems for local homeowners especially in Wekiva Village, a community located on Piedmont Wekiwa Road.

Called the Northwest Recreation Complex Relief Drive, construction on the one-way exit roadway and the parking lots began six weeks ago. The roadway will lead to the complex just south of Gate

"As long as we keep having good weather conditions, the goal is to have parking and

roadway completed by October," said Radley Williams, parks and recreation director/ interim city administrator.

The city finished building the playground almost two weeks ago, but despite the lack of accessible parking, the playground is operational.

"I know people have used [the playground]. The reason

we didn't want to do the grand opening is because we've got handicapped parking, which is included in the roadway improvements," Mayor Bryan Nelson said. "So, it makes more sense to wait till we've got handicapped parking, so that the folks that need it will be able to park and then utilize the all-inclusive playground."

A total of \$110,000 donation from Unlimited Capabilities and one of its funding partners, the Douglas G. Halliday Foundation, as well as money from the city recreation impact fees paid for the playground project.

"The special needs community is incredibly diverse, which is why we are dedicated to providing programs and events that are as inclusive as possible," Unlimited Capabilities website stated. "We strive to create a welcoming, comfortable community for all individuals that choose to join us."

The city broke ground on the all-inclusive playground in late January, and construction began during the first week of March. during the first week of March.

Federal DOT awards city \$17.3M for Ocoee-Apopka Road changes

Project's total cost is \$28M for 1.8-mile section

The U.S. Department of Transportation has awarded the city of Apopka \$17.3 million from the Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Grant Program, which will be used to improve Ocoee-Apopka Road, according to a July 16 city press release.

Formerly known as Re-American Infrastructure with Sustainability (RAISE), BUILD is award-



ing money that could cover the majority of the Ocoee-Apopka Road renovation, projected to cost \$28 million to cover a 1.8mile section.

The awarded funds will support the Ocoee-Apopka complete street and trail project, aimed to improve safety and multimodal connectivity and support sustainable growth in the southwest quadrant of

Improvements made in this project include expanding the roadway from two to four lanes, adding bicycle lanes, a multi-use path, and accessibility features such as smart lighting, sensors, and enhancements compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The application for the previous BUILD grant was led by former transportation coordinator Pam Richmond.

In 2024, the city collaborated with Kimley-Horn and Associates to give the municipality the technical assistance and strategic insight to put together a BUILD grant proposal,

according to the press release.

The city submitted a detailed application that included the following criteria: safety, environmental sustainability, quality of life, mobility and community connectivity, economic competitiveness, partnership and collaboration, innovation and project readiness.

The city's previous grant application fell short of the grant program's criteria, according to the news release. To overcome that, the team, led by city planner Jean Sanchez as well as the Kimley-Horn team, tweaked the application to help boost the city's score which eventually gave the city a winning total, the news release stat-

Right now, Ocoee-Apopka Road is a two-lane undivided roadway with no bicycle facilities or bike lanes with existing sidewalks at the Ocoee-Apopka/Harmon Road intersection, Oakmont Distribution Center, and South Bradshaw Road intersection to South Hawthorne Avenue.

The city began gathering public feedback on the Ocoee-Apopka Road project in late 2024.

At the Jan. 13 public input meeting at Apopka City Hall, Mike Woodward of Kimley-Horn said once the city receives funding, the first year would be devoted to project development and environmental study; the second and third year to design, work plan and budget completion; the fourth year to right-ofway acquisition; and the fifth to sixth year to construction.

Along the Ocoee-Apopka Road project corridor, the average daily traffic is 10,117 vehicles. The current traffic volumes discourage people from using sidewalks and bicycling on paved shoulders.

During the five-year period between 2019-2023, 100 crashes took place on Ocoee-Apopka Road: 40 of 100 crashes ended in injury, and one resulted in a death at Hawthorne Avenue, Woodward said at the Jan. 13



cording to Williams, the city spent \$6.2 million in capital, including the property's acauisition cost.

Commissioner Nick Nesta questioned Camp Wewa's economic viability. He asked Williams if the city is close to breaking even. Williams responded no.

"This was purchased before I was elected, but this council at the time agreed to it," Nesta said. "It was sold as in [with the expectation that], I want to say it was within five years, it'll break even."

Williams said the camp buildings are "in really good shape," with continual improvements on the facilities such as finishing accessible restroom renovations in the dining hall, roofing repairs and replacements throughout the camp, landscaping, and maintenance.

However, the same couldn't be said about the junior Olympic-size pool.

"The big sore thumb is the pool, which we're still assessing with a contractor," Williams said, adding that the city is trying to get a replacement estimate.

Because the estimate will be in the seven figures, "we're not prepared to put it in the request for this year," Williams said.

Williams said he has closely managed the Camp Wewa budget.

"Since I've been with the city, I have put a focus on trying to be as efficient and conscious with the operating side of this budget, because there has been some large need for capital," Williams said. "We have been trimming that budget year over year, trying to at least be mindful on that side, to be as efficient as possible, operating."

Several aspects for how to make Camp Wewa more profitable were discussed, including the need for a mar-

keting plan to boost the camp's visibility and draw in more participants, involving the city economic development director for promoting Camp Wewa, and drawing up a comprehensive plan to ensure the camp's financial sustainability.

The 19% increase for Camp Wewa stands in stark contrast to the rest of the Parks and Recreation Department's FY26 budget request of \$14,272,278, including reductions in every other division. The proposal calls for lower budgets in parks maintenance (-11.3%), athletics, recreation and events (-11.2%), cemetery operations (-70% due to no capital

needs or positions), and facilities maintenance (-4%).

The parks and rec budget includes \$1,034,019 for Camp Wewa improvements and \$4,169,596 for facilities maintenance. The department plans to renovate double cabin restrooms for \$75,000, replace the tractor pole barn for \$150,000, and rebuild sand volleyball courts for \$90,000.

overflow, and homeowners have expressed frustration over the city's management.

At Wednesday's meeting, residents were unhappy that the city expected them to foot the bill for the solution when they were not the ones who caused the problem. Rather, water issues have been worsened by new developments popping up in the city because when trees are cleared away for and concrete is poured, they create impervious surfaces that can't absorb water.

"What caused this wasn't Clear Lake Estates' fault," James Mater, president of the Clear Lake Landing homeowners association, said. "It wasn't Clear Lake Landing's fault. It was the overgrowth of the community. It's exactly what everybody complains about."

Mater called the city's proposed irrigation system "lipstick on a pig," questioning the system's maintenance cost including the possibility of taking out a loan, and that the system itself is not a financial asset to the 142 homes in his community. Mater also said that neither he nor the residents were informed about presentation in advance.

In Feb. 2023, the city deployed emergency pumping for Clear Water Lake, a closed basin system with irrigation water inflow that causes rising water levels. This temporary pumping finished in April 2023, which reduced the lake level by 3.4-ft and cost \$194,150.

The proposed long-term alternative solution chosen to mitigate the flooding at Clear Water Lake is to recycle surface water as an irrigation source.

Simonovski said this solution was the best alternative because it imposes less stress on the city's reclaimed water system and the Clear Lake Landing homeowners association owns Clear Water Lake. The St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRW-MD) and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) approved this solution.

Balmoral Group started the project design in April 2024 for \$68,900. This past January, the design was finished and permitted with the SJRWMD consumptive use permit, which allows surface water withdrawal for irrigation down to an elevation of

63 feet.

The normal water level is at an elevation of 65 feet. The current Clear Water Lake elevation is 69.3 feet, according to the presentation.

Construction cost of the Clear Lake Water irrigation project is estimated to be \$456,000: \$397,200 for construction plus \$59,600 as a 15% contingency.

The Avian Point community already contributed \$6,000 to the irrigation project, and the city may contribute another \$60,000, leaving the homeowners association with an approximate cost of \$336,000 divided by 142 units, or about \$2,400 per household, Simonovski said. To date, the city's expense is \$263,000, including \$104,000 for emergency pumping and \$16,000 for design costs, he added.

Two other alternative solutions that were considered were to pump water surface to the Northshore Reclaim Water Treatment Plant and to redo the temporary pumping whenever needed, Simonovski said.

The community workshop for the Clear Water Lake flood mitigation is scheduled for 6 p. m. on Aug. 11 at the Apopka City Hall council chamber.





Apopka officially names Marcus Neeson head football coach

Former defensive coordinator aims to keep the Apopka standard

Apopka High School officially announced Tuesday it had hired Marcus Neeson as the new head football coach.

The official announcement comes more than a month after former head coach Jeff Rolson resigned.

Rolson stepped down at the football team. end of May after a spring game loss to Jones High School that resulted in the departure of 20 players to the transfer portal.

This is Neesons's first head coaching position as he has been the defensive coordinator for the Blue Darters since Rolson took the head coaching job in 2019.

Tuesday, after a lengthy and meticulous hiring and interviewing process, Apopka High School officially announced Neeson as the new head coach of the Blue Darter

"It's an amazing opportunity," Neeson said in a phone interview Tuesday. "I'm grateful to have access to this great program and be behind the reins."

The Apopka Chief spoke with Neeson after the announcement was made official on Tuesday, and he was all business, happy that the process was complete.

Neeson said he felt relieved when the appointment was made official and said the process was not an easy one for the school, and neither was the decision.

He said that it's not easy to hire another coach for a program like Apopka given that culture and tradition within the program are very important to the city.

"You've got a superior program, a program that's above a lot of other programs in the area," Neeson said. "And it's a job that you're going to get some high-quality coaches interviewing for, and you want to make sure you make the right decision

Marcus Neeson heads skills camp for the first time

The third annual free football skills camp put on by Super Bowl Champion, and former Blue Darter, Jalen Carter was the biggest and best yet, organizers said.

been good, and don't change it up," Neeson said.

But this year, the camp had some fun new additions for the kids. The camp had a gaming truck where the kids could take a rest from the hot sun and drills for a quick game of Madden or NCAA and a dunk tank. Neeson said the kids loved both.

Neeson was mainly happy with the outcome of the camp and what his players, as well as the kids attending

the camp, walked away with from the experience.

"Overall, the camp was good," Neeson said. "I think our guys did a good job of coaching up the young kids. I put them in charge of running the stations, and I told them earlier in the week that you learn best when you can teach it to someone else. So, when you can reach one, teach one."

Neeson's first head coaching opportunity a long time coming

Former coordinator will face several challenges in rebuilding the team

Marcus Neeson, a former Apopka football defensive coordinator, has officially been named the new head coach for Blue Darter football. From his time as a player to his first years in his coaching journey, Neeson has been waiting for this opportunity.

"But I knew back then, and others knew that football coaching was probably going

to be my thing," Neeson said. "I picked up on plays and coverages better than most

kids my age. I saw the game a little differently. I was like a coach on the field when

Neeson's journey to becoming Apopka's new head football coach doesn't start in Apopka or even Florida but in Georgia. At the age of five, Neeson began playing football for the Redan Raiders in Stone Mountain, Georgia.

"I was a short, squatty, o-lineman-linebacker body," Neeson said. "I was pulling guard; I was at center. I just wanted to hit people, that's why I ended up playing those positions — and I was round at that age."

In middle school, Neeson moved to Florida and lost the baby weight, where a new coach looked at him and saw a receiver. After that, he fell in love with being a receiver.

"I went out there and I was catching balls over everyone, and I even broke my collarbone in the first game," Neeson said.

At Gulf High School in New Port Richey, Florida, Neeson started three years as a varsity receiver. Going into his senior year, his coach told him he needed him to play corner. However, it was a natural transition for Neeson, as he played both ways during his senior season, serving as both a defensive back and a wide receiver.

"My coach was like, 'Hey, I need you to play corner,' and I'm looking at him like, 'You want me to tackle people," Neeson said. "And I really hadn't played on the defense since I was probably 8 or 9, and I played corner my senior year, and receiver as well."

Neeson's first experience with coaching was a senior project where he coached under his high school coach for the Paul R. Smith Middle School basketball team in Holiday, Florida.

After his senior season, Neeson was recruited to Benedictine College in Atchison, Kansas, to play defensive back, where he played corner and safety for two years. After two years, Nee-

Fish in Apopka area lakes are biting!

Hello Folks,

I hope everyone had a great weekend, and, hopefully, you got a chance to do some fishin'. We have some rain comin' in this week, so dependin' on the weather, you might have to dodge a few raindrops when you go fishin'.

The Harris Chain was showin' out this past weekend. Congrats to Steve Bishop and Matt Gee on their win with a five bass limit that hit the scales at 20.54 pounds.

There was another tournament on the Harris Chain this past weekend where the Florida Bass League held their tournament. The winnin' team of Dylan Trevarthen and Chandler Cornelius hit the scales with five bass that weighed in at 19.97 pounds. They also caught a tagged bass that weighed 7.57 pounds. Congrats, guys, on a great win.

Folks have been catchin'

some nice bass on the Winter Haven Chain, as well. The Headwaters was still producin' nice stringers of bass this past week. Folks have been goin' out with guides on four-hour trips and catchin' 30 to 40 bass each trip. So, if you want to catch a mess of bass, you might want to plan a trip to the Headwaters real soon.

I got some good reports from the guys fishin' for panfish on Lake Kissimmee. They're catchin' limits of panfish on red worms and grass-shrimp in the pads. One report I got was that some folks're catchin' their limits by 9 a. m.

If you want to get in on the pan-fishin' in Lake Kissimmee, you might want to consider makin' a trip down there, and just go catch your limit. You're allowed to catch 50 bluegills or shellcrackers per angler. If you decide to go down there, take the family, especially if you have little'uns. They'll have a blast catchin' panfish, and you'll stay busy baitin' their hooks for 'em.

The bass fishin' is still pretty good on the Butler Chain. You'll be able to catch a lotta keeper-size bass. Most of the bass are bein' caught on plastic worms and

slow-sinkin Senko type baits. Keep an eye out for schoolers. They'll come up and bust on the bait-fish, and you need to be ready with your favorite lipless crank-bait.

The fishin' on West Lake Toho has been really hot this summer. Folks're catchin 10 to 20 bass per trip. One angler reports that he and his clients caught 51 bass in just three hours. Most of 'em were caught on shiners, and a few were caught on flukes.

This week, July 15 thru July 18th, is ICAST week at the Orange County Convention Center. ICAST is the largest Sport Fishing trade show which is held once per year. Unfortunately, the show is not open to the public. This show highlights the new products that are introduced to the fishin' community. There will be new products from rods and reels to outboard motors and anything in between.

Well, that's it for this week. Please be careful with all the rain they're expectin' this week. The last thing you want to do is get caught in a bad storm while you are out fishin'.

when it comes to hiring a head coach to lead the program moving forward."

Being a new head coach in a program after a mass exodus of players will be a challenge for Neeson, but it is one he welcomes. He said the theme for the team this season is A.P.K. — accountability, pride and knowing.

Neeson emphasized the importance of accountability and extensive knowledge. He said it applies to both the players and the coaches.

As a game and practice film connoisseur and as a student of the game, he wants his players to know and see the game the way he does.

Neeson said being knowledgeable and accountable means that everyone on the field on offense needs to know everything about what's going on. It doesn't matter if the player is a quarterback, an offensive lineman, or a wide receiver.

Neeson's philosophy is that players who want to be on the field need to know everything about the play the team is running as well as everything about the opponents' defense.

"There's going to be some accountability on their end," Neeson said. "The offense is going to be simplified, but they're going to have to know where we're attacking. If it's a run play, they have to know where we're going and what the assignment is. So, the O-line needs to be able to identify, the quarterback needs to be able to identify, as well as the receivers. They need to understand the play and communicate the coverage that they're going against."

More important than anything is keeping the Apopka Blue Darter standard intact, Neeson said. That standard of hard work, discipline, and community breeds excellence.

Neeson said that leading up to the official announcement of his appointment as head coach, he reached out to former players to determine what he needed to do in the role. The overwhelming answer was that the standard of being a Blue Darter needs to stay the same. Those former players he asked said their time as a Blue Darter was a key element in their development as men.

"I sat down with some alumni, Antwone Robinson,

the other day, and asked him and one other guy, 'Hey, what would you say that I need to do as a head coach?' And he said, 'Keep the Apopka standard, the standard.' And that meant a lot. He said that he wouldn't have been where he's at today — he wouldn't be the guy he is today without Apopka holding him accountable and keeping the standard."

Entering the head coaching position after a 4–6 season and losing 28 players since the end of the season would be a challenge for anyone. However, Nee-

son said Apopka has faced a similar situation in recent years and, within a few seasons, was back in the playoffs.

"We went through it back in 2017, and two years later, we were playing for a state championship," Neeson said. "I don't feel like there's going to be any dropoff. I feel like we've been through this, and we move forward. We've got a lot of young guys that are going to step up this year, and we've got a lot of time to invest in them. They can only go up from here."

work, tackling, turnovers, breaking into the pocket, and interceptions.

"We split them into older kids and younger kids, like your middle schoolers and your incoming freshmen, and then your elementary school kids," Neeson said. "The little kids did stations, county fair style. So we did defensive emphasis down on the little kids'

side, and the older kids did offensive and individual drills."

Neeson said he saw a lot of young talent out there and made sure to talk to the kids during the camp about wanting to keep the Apopka athletes playing for Apopka. He used the camp as an example of what being a Blue Darter is like and gave young players a peek inside of a program with

a rich history.

After the drills, the real fun began. They held sevenon-seven games before letting the kids have free range to use the gaming truck, dunk tank, as well as have fun and play with friends and other campers. They finished off the day with tug of war competitions and awards to campers who shined the most during drills.

The camp's focus this year was saying no to drugs, as Carter used the camp as a way to reach out to the Apopka youth. Carter's agent, Drew Rosenhaus, was also present at the camp and talked to the players about the importance of staying on the right path and how sports can bring structure.

"You can do whatever

you want with this simple formula — stay out of trouble, respect your parents and coaches, and hit the books," Rosenhaus said. "Athletics is amazing whether you play high school, college or professional. It teaches you discipline and toughness. You can't accomplish anything in life without hard work and discipline."

Neeson said this was the

best turnout yet and only expects it to be even more extravagant next year. He and the coaching staff joked that next year, they might just have a foam pit and a Ferris wheel out there, too.

The Apopka Chief asked Jalen Carter and his team for an interview at the camp last week, but he said he was unable to squeeze it in.

son moved back to Florida, seeking to complete his AA degree and explore coaching opportunities.

His first real coaching opportunity came in 2009, after he moved back home. A new high school was opening near the middle school where he coached for his senior project in high school.

"[The coach at Anclote High School] asked me if I wanted to come over and help out with the defense backs, because they had like a three-guy coaching staff," Neeson said. "So, I said, 'Sure, why not.' And I went over there, and they ended up giving me a full-time coaching supplement."

While coaching at Anclote High School, Neeson was a student at the University of Central Florida, where he studied sport and exercise science. In 2014, Neeson graduated with a bachelor's degree and moved to Apopka, where he found a physical education job at Clay Springs Elementary.

It wasn't until 2017 that Neeson found himself back on the field as a coach. He said that after playing phone tag with former head coach Rick Darlington, he showed up on the first day of spring practice hoping to find a way back into coaching.

"[I] said, 'Hey, I'm the guy you've been talking to,' And he goes, 'Oh, yeah, I know who you are... You start tomorrow,' I said, 'Oh, okay,' And day two out there I'm coaching defensive backs. By the fall season, he made me the freshman defensive coordinator, and

then I just kind of worked my way up the ladder from there."

Neeson said that he took over as the Apopka varsity defensive coordinator a few years ago when former head coach Jeff Rolson transitioned to focusing more on the offense. He said that he somewhat fell into the role because no other coach wanted to take on the responsibility of calling the defense.

Neeson was comfortable in his position until the end of the 2025 school year. After a 4-6 season and a spring game loss to Jones High School, which saw 20 players leave or transfer out of the program, it was apparent that something was amiss within the Apopka football program.

Rolson came to Neeson on the last day of the 2025 school year to tell him that he was considering resigning. The two men went out for dinner, and Rolson laid out Neeson's options.

"So Rolson told me, 'So you can wait it out and see who they hire. Or you can put in for the position,' And I sat there and wasn't really sure what to do. But I thought about it and decided to put my name in the hat and see what happened," Neeson said.

Neeson said that he has learned a great deal during his time at Apopka and is glad to have had the opportunity to work under two championship coaches, Darlington and Rolson.

"And it's been humbling," Neeson said.

Neeson said he will take a lot from both Darlington's and Rolson's approaches, but will also implement his own philosophy, one with a focus on preparation and knowledge. Neeson said his philosophy comes from Sun Tzu's "The Art of War."

According to the book, knowing your enemy is half the battle, and Neeson said he embraces this through his love of game and practice


"I'm big on film. I watch film and analyze every little detail," Neeson said. "I'm going to see what you like to do and then I'm going to take that away and force you to do something that you're not comfortable with, that's going to be on offense and defense."

Now it's time for Nee-

son to take the reins and lead Apopka through a tough fall, after its worst season in 20 years. In the 2025 season, Apopka faces five teams who finished in the Top 50 in the state last year, including two state champions, one state runner-up, one regional runner-up, and one final-four finisher.

Neeson is also coming into the season with just three returning starters, according to Apopka's 2025 Florida Citrus Sports Media Day documentation.

Neeson said his goal for the program one year from now is to return to being state championship contenders. He said the only way to do that is to keep the Apopka standard as it is and foster excellence through discipline and hard work.

cookbook, here are Sweet and Sour Carrots. This recipe, which you can serve either hot or cold, was contributed by Irene Ustler.

If you like a salad extravaganza, try this Wilted Spinach Delight! It's from Panama City's Canary Cottage, in Joyce LaFray Young's book, Country Cookin', and it looks teriffic!

How about making fresh peach cobbler? It is so good. We have a recipe from Allrecipes.com for Fresh Southern Peach Cobbler for you. This recipe is by aeposey, who said, "This peach cobbler recipe is something I've perfected over the years. It's loved by all. Use fresh Georgia peaches, of course!" She updated the recipe on May 18 of this year. It takes 20 minutes to prepare and 40 minutes to cook. Not too bad for a wonderful dessert!

According to SouthernLiving.com, "The peach season is pretty short, running from late spring through the summer, but there's nothing like it.
