# Apopka weighs 15–20% utility rate increases for FY26

Multi-year plan for rate increases also considered

A company that did a study on the city's utility rates recommended increases of 15.5% in water and wastewater, 15% in sanitation and 20% in stormwater for the fiscal year (FY) 2026 budget.

vice president of Raftelis, a local government and utility management consulting firm, presented the results of the utilities rate study at the July 17 budget workshop at Apopka City Hall.

Such rate increases would fund infrastructure projects, maintain and replace aging equipment, build up cash reserves, keep up with growing infrastructure needs, and stay competitive with other local

Henry Thomas, senior municipalities and utilities, Thomas said.

> "We would recommend you adopt the proposed adjustment plan," Thomas said. "We would conclude that it will maintain positive cash flow, that it'll meet coverage requirements for any borrowing that we've assumed, and that operating reserves will build up and remain at targeted levels."

For an average residential customer using 6,000 gallons of water, this means that the water/wastewater bill will increase from \$71.38 to \$82.46 per month; the sanitation bill, from \$23.13 to \$26.60 per month; and stormwater assessment, from \$475 to \$570 annually, according to Thomas.

What's more, after 2026, Thomas recommended rate adjustments of 15.5% in 2027 and 3.5% for water and wastewater in 2028 and 2029,

AdventHealth Apopka will be looking for a new hospital CEO.

Parker Pridgen moving to California citing family reasons

AdventHealth Apopka CEO Parker Pridgen has announced his resignation from the hospital, effective in Au-

"It has been a distinct honor to serve in partnership with so many dedicated community leaders, officials and residents of West Orange County," Pridgen said in a statement disseminated to Apopka community leaders on July 15. "Together we have witnessed remarkable stories of healing, hope and progress that reflect the very best of our mission and values."

Pridgen's resignation will take place in August, although an exact final day is not known to ensure a smooth transition. He and his family will move closer to their loved ones in California.

"This decision comes with mixed emotions, as AdventHealth Apopka and the broader Apopka and West Orange County communities have truly become a cherished part of our lives," Pridgen said.

Pridgen assumed the role of CEO on Sept. 25, 2022, after serving as CFO and COO of AdventHealth Cen-

tral Texas and AdventHealth Rollins Brook. In addition to graduating from AdventHealth's executive leadership program, he earned an MBA from the University of Oregon and a bachelor's degree in accounting from Walla Walla University.

At ued to grow as a high-performing, trusted health care destination in one of Greater Orlando's fastest-growing regions," AdventHealth said in a statement provided to The Apopka Chief. AdventHealth Apopka moved to 2100 Ocoee Apopka Road in December 2017, after operating from 201 North Park Ave.

Commissioner, mayor spar over accuracy of meeting minutes

Apopka City Clerk Susan Bone is developing a policy for City Council meeting minutes after Commissioner Nick Nesta and Mayor Bryan Nelson sparred over the accuracy of past meeting notes during last week's meeting.

At the meeting, the council discussed the possibility of Bone developing a policy, but commissioners did not vote on it.

Nesta, who proposed the idea during his council report, said it would promote further transparency and accuracy about what was said and transpired at the meetings.

During his presentation, Nesta highlighted three instances where discrepancies occurred, all from the July 2 City Council meeting. Each involved residents commenting at the meeting.

# CRA to launch residential façade grant repair program

Qualification is max of \$30K per property over 10year period

The Apopka Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) Board has approved the framework of its façade grant repair program, which

aims to help homeowners struggling to afford necessary home repairs upgrade their properties exterior.

The city plans to launch the program Aug. 1, aiming to address code compliance issues and eventually raise property values in the CRA district.

Eligibility for the façade grant repair program are owner-occupied singlefamily homes, duplexes and townhomes within the CRA boundaries, with a maximum of \$30,000 per property over a 10-year period.

Before the program launches, interim city administrator Radley Williams and city attorney Cliff Shepard will finalize changes on the program.

The CRA is unrolling its façade grant repair program to push forward on its CRA

"You had asked us to prepare when we were under the sort of crisis edict from the Legislature, among other things, a façade grant program that could be used to help us spend some money before we might be forced not to be able to spend it again," Shepard said to the board. "Obviously, the crisis abated, which took some of the time pressure off of this assignment."

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## Meeting minutes do not need to be complicated

At the last City Council meeting, we had a discussion about what the minutes should or should not include.

By the end of the night (after 11 p.m.), I played a YouTube video from Susan Leahy, MA, CSP, whose website is RobertsRulesMadeSimple.com, where

she describes that City Council minutes are the details of the business that was handled in the meeting.

Leahy detailed five "Do's and Don'ts" that should guide the city clerk as to what minutes should look like. She recommends that these are minutes, not seconds—meaning only high-level details should be included.

The minutes are a record of what was done in the meeting, not everything that was said by every single board member or constituent. Use the guide to record the action for each item of business.

Enter the exact wording as finally adopted: meeting minutes are historical as well as the legal record, so it is critically important to record every motion.

You must record all counted votes—who voted in the affirmative and who voted in opposition.

Do not include opinions or debate content. As the recording secretary, you are not a court stenogra-

pher that needs to list all the opinions and comments of board members.

The clerk's job is to capture clearly the actions taken during the meeting, and individual comments and opinions are not relevant to the business decisions that the

council will take, so don't include

Don't waste too much time approving minutes. This should move quickly so that you can get to the business at hand. Taking too much time on minutes means maybe council members need additional training

Remember to keep the info specific and understandable, making sure that the motion is clear to approve, deny or move to a date cer-

You can always go to YouTube for the City Council's unedited version of meetings, and the clerk's office also keeps an audio recording of each meeting.

Meeting minutes do not need to be complicated. Just as a side note, Orange County only lists speakers with no comment summary. If you have five minutes to spare, please go to YouTube and play Susan Leahy's video for her unedited advice on tak-

## Strong Towns advocates for strategic growth

This fall I signed up for a cohort of leaders from across the nation to learn more about the Strong Towns approach to improving cities. Strong Towns is a non-profit organization that advocates for financially strong and resilient cities and municipalities.

The philosophy emphasizes incremental development, bottomup solutions, and long-term financial sustainability over short-term

Here's a more detailed breakdown of Strong Towns' core prin-

Financial Resiliency: Prioritizing the long-term financial health of communities by focusing on sustainable infrastructure development and responsible budgeting. Incremental Development: Encouraging small, similar improvements and investments. Bottom-Up Approach: Empowering local governments and residents to drive change and adapt solutions to their individual community. People-Centered Design: Emphasizing walkable, mixed-use development, and safe streets. Rejection of the "Suburban Experiment": Critiquing the financial unsustainability of post-war suburban development patterns **County Commissioner** District 2



and advocating for a shift toward more compact, mixed-use, and walkable urban areas while protecting rural settlements and communities.

In his seminal book, Strong Towns — A Bottom Up Revolution to Build American Prosperity, Chuck Marohn wrote a chapter on place-oriented government. It talks about "tweaks" to focus on broad wealth creation. Let's face it: When citizens want things, the issue is always finding sufficient

Marohn lists in Table 9.1 conventional priorities and how if shifted slightly they can produce more wealth. In engineering, while critical to reduce congestion, why not also build value? When the state or county widens or resurfaces a roadway, a city or its volunteers could create a new green

Marohn also warns about simply securing state and federal funding to build new "stuff" if there isn't a current, sufficient tax base to support the ongoing maintenance obligations of said project.

For economic development, Marohn states conventional tactics encourage the recruitment of new businesses. However, what if they helped 50 existing businesses add one new position each? While creating high paying jobs is an appropriate function, how about creating spaces that promote job cre-

This has been the practice of my "people group" teams. As they clean up corridors, the volunteers inspire others to do likewise. Then, voila! There is a new business or new single-family home in this previously blighted area.

Some revisions to make this more correct, specific and understandable are in order. To start with, it is silly to say "first person plural" to mean more than one. The plural of person is "people." Use it.

Next up, there should be subcategories to be more specific: "we are ready to order," First People Casual, indicates yourself and a handful of others. This would be spelled with a lower-case "w" in

"We need to build a wall, We need to pay off student debts, We need to get out of the U.N." First People Political, meaning about half the portion of the country that has an opinion. Always an uppercase "W."

"WE're No. 1, WE are awesome," First People Collegiate. This is used for people who wear the same color shirts and who feel superior because of the actions of other people in that color. Spell this all-capitals to indicate intensity of feeling.

The transfer portal for college athletes has further complicated that form of the pronoun.

Not long ago, the quarterback of what I think of as MY team said, "we are looking forward to having a great year." This could be another subcategory called First People Temporary, indicating "I meant 'us' when I said it, but it only counts until I can cut a better deal." It would also call for a variation of spelling, maybe WEE.

On the other hand, that could be avoided by switching to a completely different pronoun — ME. That's the one a lot of athletes seem to have in mind when they say "we," so why not make it official?

# Resident comments should be priority at city meetings

meeting on August 24, 2024, the mayor, unannounced, moved the public comment, the primary opportunity for our taxpayers to address City Council, to the end of the agenda. This was after the mayor dismissed department heads and cut off the YouTube live feed. This denied taxpayers the opportunity to address concerns and have them resolved immediately by the department heads. It also denied

At the Apopka City Council taxpayers following the meetings on YouTube from hearing public comment. Commissioners Alexander Smith and Nadia Anderson supported the mayor's decision over the objections of Commissioners Diane Velazquez and Nick Nesta and multiple taxpayers. This was, in my view, an attack on our First Amendment rights ... "prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech ... and to petition the government for a

redress of grievances."

As hard as it is to believe, three of our elected officials supported denying taxpayers the opportunity to address City Council for all listeners to hear, further demonstrating their lack of respect for taxpayer input. On May 25, 2025, the mayor moved public comment to near the beginning of the agenda, with two significant changes. The changes reduced taxpayers' speaking time from four minutes to three minutes. And the

public comment period takes place immediately after the call to order but before the opening prayer and Pledge of Allegiance.

This slap in the face of taxpayers marks the only city meeting where the prayer and Pledge of Allegiance do not come immediately after calling the meeting to order. Makes one wonder if the mayor's change of heart was due to the nine months of taxpayer and Commissioners Velazquez

and Nesta protests or the fact he has an upcoming election. I am willing to accept the immediate resignation of any public official who stands behind limiting or denying a taxpayer's right to question or otherwise participate in their government. Please keep this in mind when you vote in our upcoming election. We deserve and must demand better! It is time for a change!

### Sanchez: AFD managing fire hydrants to promote public safety

Flow tests, hydrant ratings based on national guidelines

The Apopka Fire Department (AFD) is working to promote public safety through proactive fire hydrant management and following new fire hydrant standards.

The discussion about fire hydrants came up at the July 9 fiscal year (FY) 2026 city budget workshop, where fire and police departments presented their proposed budgets to the Apopka City Council.

In discussion about the FY26 fire budget, Commissioner/Vice Mayor Diane Velazquez asked Fire Chief Wil Sanchez, who was presenting his department's budget requests, to educate her about fire hydrants.

"How are we now? Because I'm seeing different colors and the new developments that are coming in," Velazquez said, noting she had received questions from residents about the issue. "Are we putting fire hydrants in before they even start working? How many fire hydrants are we putting in each of these developments?"

Sanchez discussed the implementation of new fire hydrant standards, with the thirdparty company HydroMax conducting flow tests and rating hydrants based on National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) guidelines.

In residential areas, a hydrant is placed every 500 feet, while for commercial properties, hydrants are placed based on specific requirements. The placement depends on distance to water lines, distance from previous hydrants, the building type, and the fire flow rate needed, Sanchez told Velazquez.

A fire flow rate is the amount of water needed to suppress a fire.

The fire hydrants' conditions, water flows and fire hydrant locations are all part of the auditing process the Insurance Services Office (ISO) conducts.

ISO rates fire departments nationwide on their quality of fire protection efforts. The AFD is an ISO Class 1, the best score the ISO could offer. A fire department's ISO rating influences homeowners' insurance pre-

"You can't just say, 'Hey, we've got 100 homes. We have X amount of hydrants going in," Sanchez said. "It also depends on how far, as far as the nearest

hydrant is, and where they have to connect to."

Ensuring the condition of hydrants is a collaborative effort between the fire department, water department and the city Development Review Committee (DRC).

"That's a collaborative effort between the water department, as far as they tell us, as far as what they could actually provide," Sanchez said. "That is the part of DRC is making sure that all the players at the table are aware of, hey, what development is going in, what are the requirements, what are the needed fire flows for it, and can we actually meet that standard?"

At the budget workshop, a

local resident, Dr. Phyllis Olmstead, praised the fire department for its diligence in community service.

One point she raised was regarding the frequency of mowing grass around fire hydrants. The overgrowth of grass had obscured fire hydrants to the point where they were difficult to see.

"I happen to notice just the top of one little hydrant out there, and the grass was four feet in front of it," Olmstead said. "So, they're trying to catch up with these things. They can't be out there every day checking every hydrant, but the departments have to work together, and it wasn't the mowing department's fault if the vendors weren't doing it."

At the July 9 budget workshop, the Apopka Fire Department asked for more personnel, including nine to staff a second tower truck, three more firefighters and three more Emergency Medical Services (EMS) captains.

The FY26 fire department's budget is \$29,587,063, which includes rises in costs for fire equipment and personnel, including \$627,000 for a new tower truck, \$61,800 for EMS billing services, and \$112,300 for costs of pharmaceuticals and medical supplies.







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# New center aims to give women options for their pregnancies

Main Street organization had July 17 ribbon cutting

Hosting its ribbon cutting on July 17, a pregnancy center in downtown Apopka is focused on serving women facing unplanned pregnancies with support, education, resources, and alternatives like adoption.

In a non-judgmental environment, the Above & Beyond Pregnancy Center provides free services such as pregnancy tests, educational programs, baby supplies, options counseling, ultrasounds and post-abortion recovery.

The center assists around three to five clients weekly, often homeless or living precariously.

"My heart is to help them navigate through it," Teresa Sawyer, founder of Above & Beyond Pregnancy Center, said. "I'm not judging them. I'm not coming down on them. We all make mistakes. However, we want to make sure that they are well educated as to their choices. Not just one choice. They end up

The center teams up with other pregnancy centers in the area, including Winter Garden and Sanford to pro-

vide comprehensive support to women experiencing unplanned pregnancies.

The center is affiliated with several organizations, including Heartbeat International, Walk for Life, Apopka Area Chamber of Commerce and the Orlando Christian Chamber of Commerce.

"Sometimes come in here, and ... there's abuse," Sawyer said. "I can get them connected with the abuse center."

A benefit breakfast and a walk for life event are among the center's upcoming community events, with the intent to organize one event per quarter to raise awareness in the community.

Sawyer previously worked as a director for the Apopka Pregnancy Care Center, also located in Apopka, that served a diverse clientele, including Hispanic and Creole-speaking women.

Under the façade grant repair program, properties in foreclosure or with significant unpaid property taxes will not qualify for the program. Homeowners must provide proof of residency and use licensed contractors for improvements.

At its July 16 meeting, the CRA Board discussed various qualifications and rules for participating in the façade renovation program.

The CRA will pay contractors directly rather than reimbursing homeowners, with the CRA managing progress payments and getting the necessary documentation, Shepard said.

The program will allow homeowners to select their own contractors though they must be properly licensed or select from city-approved contractors through a request for qualification process.

Any properties awarded grants will receive a deed restriction or lien to ensure funds aren't immediately lost if the property is sold shortly after improvements are made.

CRA member John Drago raised concerns that historical buildings might get razed because of online permit processes and said there must be a way to protect such structures.

While researching this topic and speaking with a building department official, Drago said he used as an example, 21 E. Orange St., known as the MitchellTibbetts House, which is on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places.

Drago gave the building official a list of registered buildings to protect the historical structures.

"The building department has no idea what's on the register relative to the CRA, and if somebody submitted an application, they could demolish that house," Drago said. "That's not what the intent of the National Register is for."

The CRA district has 633 acres with mix of resi-

dences, businesses and historic properties in downtown Apopka.

In 1969, the state Legislature created CRAs to assist local governments restore areas that become blighted. To fund improvements, CRAs use revenue from property tax increases.

The CRA Board is comprised of all Apopka City Council members as well as two other appointed members. The next board meeting is scheduled for 6 p. m. on Aug. 20 at Apopka City Hall.

and 6.5% per year until 2029 for sanitation. No multi-year rate plan for stormwater exists at this time.

At the budget workshop, the City Council requested city finance director Blanche Sherman to dispatch notices to residents about the proposed rate increases for water and wastewater, sanitation and stormwater by Aug. 1.

#### Impact fees

Raftelis' study also evaluated impact fees and potential needed adjustments. The purpose of impact fees is to make sure new developments help pay for infrastructure costs, pay for the expansion of public safety amenities, recreation areas, and other city infrastructure, and relieve the strain on current residents to pay for growthrelated expenditures.

Thomas said his firm recommends that police impact fees increase from \$747 to \$1,262 per dwelling unit; fire impact fees, from \$708 to \$1,511 per dwelling unit; and parks and recreation impact fees, from \$1,060 to \$1,358 for single-family units.

There are legislative restrictions that would make it hard to implement full impact fee increases, including keeping a maximum increase at 25% of the current rate. Increases must also be done over two-year increments, can't exceed 50% of the current fee without "extraordinary circumstances," and only be increased once every four years, Thomas said.

When Commissioner Nick Nesta asked Thomas if Raftelis has a projected rate increase plan for impact fees similar to what was created for water and wastewater, Thomas said Raftelis does not currently have an updated plan for that.

"You need to work on that because you'd ultimately like to know where that rate needs to land," Thomas said. "But I think you know any effort to kind of try to increase it without putting too much burden on people is smart right now."

The City Council plans to discuss impact fees at the Aug. 6 meeting, specifically historical data on when impact fees were last increased and possible implementation

The actual rate adoption and final FY26 budget hearings will occur in September.

The tentative FY26 city budget hearing is set for 5:15 p. m. on Sept. 3 in the Apopka City Hall Council chamber, where the council will vote on whether to keep the FY26 proposed millage rate at 4.6876, a 6.18% increase over the rolled back rate of 4.4146.

The rolled back rate is the rate that would produce about the same amount of revenue as the previous year's rate.

The 4.6876 millage rate would yield about \$36,617,203 in property tax revenues for 2025-26. A millage rate is the tax rate for each \$1,000 of taxable property value.

The total FY26 general fund revenues are projected to yield nearly \$103,041,608. The city's general fund service levels, personnel and capital needs show a total operating and capital budget of about \$108,611,697.

The fiscal year runs from Oct. 1 to Sept. 30.

# Little Angels to open in Apopka

Special needs daycare to share space with One World Pediatrics

Little Angels Prescribed Pediatric Extended Care (PPEC) will open a new location within the next two weeks at 1023 West Orange Blossom Trail.

The special needs daycare will share space with One World Pediatrics, whose founders, Drs. Jag Ambwani and Dolly Ubhrani, serve as Little Angels' medical directors. Little Angels Apopka will work with the Longwood and Orlando locations to provide therapy, transportation and a food program to children with diverse medical needs.

"Sometimes, the hospital will call us and be like, 'Hey, we have a baby that needs a PPEC, and they'll refer them right from the hospital," regional director of nursing Christy Columbus said. "We can take kids with trachs, ventilators, G tubes — you'll see a variety of different kids — and we're staffed with RNs, LPNs and CANs to be able to meet all the medical needs."

Columbus said the team recognized the need for a Little Angels in Apopka when they received several transportation requests from city residents.

"It was a long commute from Longwood to Apopka, so it was gonna help with that transportation issue, too," Columbus said.

Columbus currently works from Little Angels Longwood but will also assist the Apopka location once it opens. Her primary role is to write and update

each patient's plan of care.

"These kids see like seven to ten doctors," Columbus said. "So it's our job as a PPEC to keep up with all those orders, keep up with every doctor, and change their plan to reflect what that child needs every day."

Columbus entered the medical field as a NICU nurse after earning her bachelor's degree in nursing from the University of Central Florida (UCF). But she finds her work at Little Angels more rewarding, since she gets to build deeper relationships with the patients and their families.

Ultimately, Columbus wants to provide early intervention for children like her son. When her son was younger, Columbus would work as a NICU nurse over the weekend. But when he was 20 months old, he started seizing and became a completely different person.

"He was this vigorous child with bright eyes and a full future," Columbus said.

"When I brought him back, he wasn't himself. He had those dead eyes. He stopped talking, he couldn't walk anymore, and he didn't want to eat."

After her son started acting differently, Columbus would pay out-of-pocket to bring her son to therapy Monday-Thursday, since Florida's free early intervention program did not give her son the attention he needed.

"They were giving me this gloom and doom synopsis of my child," Columbus said. "I was like, 'You don't know him. I believe in him. If I don't believe in him, who will?""

Now, thanks to early intervention, her 20-year-old son can drive and works "a big boy job." She credits him for his hard work.

Columbus' desire to help children like her son led her to earn a master's degree in pediatric health from UCF in 2014 and to join the Little Angels team in 2021. And the other staff share a similar passion. Many have worked in pediatrics for over 15 years, and several staff members have children with special needs.

Little Angels PRN Daviqua Riley, who will also be helping at the Apopka location, placed her son in Little Angels after trying a different PPEC.

"Some things my son wasn't doing, he is doing now with the help of therapy," Riley said.

Riley said her son can now tie his shoes, and Little Angels is also teaching him how to read and spell his name.

"I've been very passionate as far as caring for medically needy kids because I'm on both sides of it," Riley said. "I know how it is as a parent, and I know how it is as a work-

Columbus said she wishes she could help more children, but she is grateful for the opportunity she has discovered through Little Angels.

"God gave me the best gift in the world," Columbus said. "He gave me my son back. If I can help anybody else get their kids to that level, I want to."



# Marion County claims 'Horse Capital of the World' title

Horse, pony population of county tops U.S.

If you don't own a horse or are not really into thoroughbred racing, you may not know how high Florida ranks in the world of this sport. But for those in the know, it is no surprise that Marion County can credibly claim the title of "Horse Capital of the World."

Marion County's population of horses and ponies is greater than that of any other county in the United States, and globally, it is one of the top thoroughbred breeding regions.

Ocala is home to the Florida Thoroughbred Breeders & Owners Association (FTBOA) Museum and Gallery. You can learn just about anything you might want to know about thoroughbred breeding and horse racing there.

"We produce more thoroughbreds annually than any place outside of Kentucky," said Brock Sheridan, editor-inchief of Florida Equine Communications. "California produces a few more foals, but we certainly win more races."

He said the museum is unique.

"There's some cool stuff here you can only find in this museum," Sheridan said. "It's the closest you can get to a Kentucky Derby trophy without winning it."

So, how did Ocala and Marion County come to be thoroughbred breeding central? Karen Grimes, owner of

Farm Tours of Ocala, said geology has much to do with it.

"We have lime rock base

"We have lime rock base close to the surface, and the limestone inserts calcium and other nutrients into the grass," she said. "Horses eat the grass here, which builds tremendous bone density."

Grimes said there are only three other places in the world that have this geography: in France, in parts of England and Ireland, and in Lexington, Kentucky.

"And those places are cold," she said.

Grimes, whose threehour tour gives visitors a good glimpse of what goes into horse breeding, called Ocala the "kindergarten for thoroughbreds."

"Ninety percent of thoroughbreds on the East Coast come here to get their start because we have great weather in the wintertime," she said.

The climate helps because the warmer weather lets the foals get out and about much

"A horse is usually born in

January, February or March," Sheridan said. "In Florida, a foal can drop and start running around immediately. If born in Kentucky or New York, the foal must stay in the stall until it gets warmer."

The museum serves as FT-BOA headquarters and is full of equestrian treasures.

Many Florida thoroughbreds are Kentucky Derby winners; their awards are displayed for everyone.

The achievements of Florida's first Kentucky Derby winner, Needles, and his 1956 trophy, along with the Needles collection, which includes the

Once Needles staked his claim to fame, more people started coming down here to breed horses. Ocala and Marion County were on their way

to becoming their trademarked

name as the World Horse Capi-

tal, with the museum and gallery coming along later.

"We built this building in 2000, and when we constructed the buildings, we constructed this museum," said Sheridan, adding the trophies are part of a permanent collection with others on loan.

Another famous Florida thoroughbred whose glories are also on display is Dr. Fager, named the "Horse of the Year" in 1968 after winning four titles. The collection includes the "speeding ticket" issued to Dr. Fager as a publicity stunt after he returned home from the races that year. No other thoroughbred has topped that record for that dirt mile.

The museum also includes the honors won by Affirmed, the last Florida-bred Triple Crown winner in 1978.

"Florida-bred horses have won six Kentucky Derbies; that's more Kentucky Derby winners than any other state outside of Kentucky," Sheridan said.

Many of the silks worn by jockeys who race Florida thoroughbreds are also part of the museum collection.

"The silks the jockey is wearing are the owner's colors," Sheridan said. "Some of these silks belong to some of the giant farms in Marion County throughout the years.

In addition, an extensive gallery of equine-focused original art is on display in the museum, its library, halls, and boardroom. The equine-related cartoons and sketches hung in the restroom, at least the women's restroom, are an added treat.

A life-sized, painted fiberglass horse named Champ at the front of the museum and gallery building catches the visitor's eye before one even enters. And that's only the beginning.

Admission is complimentary, although donations for the Florida Thoroughbred Charities horse retirement farm and student scholarships are appreciated. The museum (801 SW 60th Ave., Ocala) is open from 8:30 a. m. to noon and 1–4:30 p. m. Monday through Friday

"I'm asking tonight that we instruct the city attorney, Cliff Shepard, to draft a policy for City Council approval that ensures this manipulation, distortion for political gain at the expense of the residents does not continue to occur in the future," Nesta said.

Nesta accused Mayor Bryan Nelson of pressuring City Clerk Susan Bone to make changes to the minutes. Nelson pushed back and said communication with Bone about the minutes is infrequent.

During his mayor's report, Nelson defended Bone and played a video featuring professional speaker and coach Susan Leahy describing the do's and don'ts of transcribing minutes. The video is from her YouTube channel Robert's Rules Made Simple, a company that offers training and courses breaking down Robert's Rules of Order for conducting meetings.

After playing the video, Nelson said Bone has been following proper procedure for recording minutes and is not engaging in the "don'ts" on the list.

In an interview with The Apopka Chief on Tuesday, July 22, Nelson said he has not asked Bone to change meeting minutes in more than a year, when he said he last requested changes to misspelled names and grammatical errors.

fit Commissioner Nesta's narrative," Nelson said.

In a separate interview, Shepard said it would be unusual for a municipality to have a meeting minutes policy.

"Meeting minutes policy is not something that is standard," Shepard said. "Some cities have something, others don't. There are numerous ways that are potentially correct based on whatever the city desires to keep minutes."

Various types of meeting minutes exist, but there were three types Shepard highlighted: action minutes, verbatim minutes and summary minutes.

Action minutes are records of motions, who made them, who seconded them and the vote, excluding discussions.

Verbatim minutes He defended his vote try to capture every word spoken during the meeting, which, if taken during meetings that last several hours, could result in many pages of minutes, according to Shepard.

"When they don't get it exactly right, you have the issues that have come up here where somebody says, 'I said something different,' or 'you didn't catch the meaning of what I was trying to say,' or whatever," Shepard

Summary minutes, which according to Shepard are a hybrid of action and verbatim minutes, give a high-level overview of the discussion and the decision made, but may not record all thoughts and

"The summary is also a problem, at least potentially, because, again, in creating a summary that is somebody's view of what the important stuff was, it may not capture, obviously, every thought that everybody had that spoke to the issue," Shepard said.

"And then you get people who will say, 'Well, I said this, and that's not in there. I express that thought, and that's not in there."

Shepard said that if he were asked for his suggestion on the matter, he would prefer simplifying to action minutes.

"My recommendation is just to go with action minutes and let the tape of the meetings speak for itself as to who said what about what issue, as opposed to try to recast or summarize or paraphrase what everybody says," he

The legal purpose of minutes is to record the actions a voting body has taken, not the debates or the discussions leading up to the vote, Shepard said. However, it's up to the body to decide how to record its minutes, he added.

Nesta did not respond to requests for comment for this story.





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

# Apopka softball boasts 3 star senior pitchers

Millspaugh, Bartkin, Aeschilman combined for a 3.13 ERA this season

The Apopka softball pitching staff for the upcoming 2026 season has the potential to make some waves. The Blue Darters have three star senior pitchers returning for the spring season.

The Blue are coming off a historic 2025 season in which they finished 22–6, ranked 85th in the state, were District 3 runners-up, and Region 1 semifinalists. The team collected more wins this season than the last two combined.

It was a team effort all season, but a significant portion of their success can be attributed to their formidable pitching staff: Ava Millspaugh, Sydney Bartkin and Mia Aeschilman.

In the 2025 season, Darters Apopka's three junior pitchers had a combined ERA of 3.13 over 153.2 innings, allowing 98 runs, with only 70 of those being earned. Those three pitchers gave up just 2.5 earned runs per game. They also collected 17 wins, three saves, three no-hitters and two perfect

Millspaugh was Apopka's top arm this year on the mound, and it's easy to see why with her consistency. She has also been part of the varsity team since her freshman year.

In her time at Apopka and on the Blue Darter softball team, she earned many accolades, including the National Society of High School Scholars, second team Metro West Conference pitcher of the year, finalist for Central Florida

pitcher of the year and Class 7A player of the year, and Apopka High School pitcher of the year, as awarded by head coach Mike MacWith-

New head coach attends Monday practice

Last Monday may have marked a milestone in more ways than one for the Apopka Pop Warner organization. Apopka football's new head coach, Marcus Neeson, and members of the team attended the first day of pads for Apopka Pop Warner practice, aiming to bridge the gap between the high school and youth programs.

Bryant said he does not blame anyone in particular for the separation between the programs over the last few years. He just wants the divide to be a thing of the

We are in the dog days of summer, but the fishin' isn't too bad for most folks.

Folks're gettin' on the water real early and catchin' some nice bass.

The Headwaters and the Stick Marsh are still producin' 20 to 30 bass per trip. Good size bass are bein' caught on shiners and artificials. And chatter-baits, swim-baits, and spinnerbaits have also been producin' some nice bass.

Last week, ICAST held its annual convention in Orlando. This is where major fishin' brands introduce their latest products to dealers and buyers in the fishin' industry. The show isn't open to the public, but there was plenty of coverage of the event. You can see a lot of podcasts on the internet if you're interested in seein' the new products.

Kyle at Bitter's B&T reports that he fished West Lake Toho over the weekend, and that the lake looked really good. He reports that the bass fishin' was pretty good, as well. He also re-

ported that the FWC has been sprayin' a lot of the lake, but the fishin' is still doin' good.

This past last week on the Wednesday Night Shootout at Johns Lake, they had 17 boats fishin' this past week. The winnin' team of Neil Davis and Jack Sanders weighed in three bass that hit the scales at 10 pounds. They also had the big bass that weighed in at 4.85 pounds.

The Harris Chain will be busy again this weekend because there are gonna be a couple of tournaments goin' on. So, you be careful if you decide to fish there this weekend.

The bass fishin' on the Harris Chain has been a little tough for a few weeks now. The water temperatures are pretty high right now, so the fishin' has slowed down in most of the lakes.

There are lots of fish hangin' out in the Kissimmee grass right now, but you'll have to cover miles of grass-line to find the right one. You'll catch a lot of the smaller bass in the grass.

The docks on the chain are producin' some nice bass, too. The water is cooler, and the dock provides plenty of shade for the bass. Folks're flippin' the docks with creature baits and catchin' 'em that way, too.

If you like to fish offshore on the chain fish, the submerged hydrilla and eelgrass beds as well as the shell-beds are the best spots to fish. You need to fish it real slow durin' this time of the year.

We have a new moon comin' up this week, so that'll help the fishin'. And we should be gettin' some rain this week, as well, and that will also help cool the water down some. You need to be gettin' on the water either real early or real late in the day after the rains.

Folks're catchin some bass in the Maitland Chain and the Butler Chain, as well. The best time to fish the Maitland Chain has been at night. You need to fish the submerged hydrilla and eelgrass beds throughout the chain. If you try your luck on the Butler Chain, you need to get on the water as early as possible.

The bass will be feedin' early on the bait-fish along the shoreline grass. Once that ol' sun gets up, you may need to move out to the deeper water and fish the pepper grass patches and hydrilla.

The best baits have been plastic worms and slow sinkin' Senko type baits.

Well, that's it for this week. I hope you have a great week, and, hopefully you get to go fishin'.

Bartkin's favorite moment as an athlete was this year in her game against Eustis. At the plate, she went 3-for-4 with two runs and two RBIs while also belting her first home run. She also finished with a 1.62 ERA after 4.1 innings on the mound.

She said that she got into

softball at a very young age and stuck with it.

"When I was 7, I watched my very first softball game, which was my cousin's high school game," Bartkin said. "I was so intrigued by it that when I got home, I made my parents sign me up for the rec league in town."

Bartkin finished the season with a 3.04 ERA, three wins, two saves and one perfect game. She collected 33 strikeouts while giving up 14 walks, 20 earned runs, and three home runs. In 46 innings, opponents hit .221 against her and had a meager .278 on-base percentage.

Bartkin's plans to attend Florida State University and spend her freshman year abroad in London, England.

"My plan is to major in international business, then apply to law school to become an international lawyer," Bartkin said.

Bartkin advice for other student athletes is to cherish every moment in front of them.

"Time will fly, and before you know it, the only thing you will have left is the memories you made while playing the sport," Bartkin said.

What Bartkin will remember most about her time as a student athlete is her teammates and friends.

"Without the friends I've made, I wouldn't have made it this far," Bartkin said. "The people I've met have been my favorite thing about both sports. I will remember them the most."

#### Mia Aeschilman

Is another four-year letterman. She said her favorite memory in her time as a member of the team was last season's trip to Jacksonville to face Atlantic Coast for the first round of the state playoffs. Aeschilman enjoyed the long rides in the bus with her team.

"We battled the whole way through that game up until the seventh inning, winning 10-9 and moving on to regional semifinals," Aeschilman said. "I started the game pitching four innings with only three earned runs. The energy of that game was electric. We all wanted to win to keep moving forward further in the playoffs."

Going into her senior year at Apopka, Aeschilman is in the top 10% of her class and has received a BACE (Biotechnician Assistant Credentialing Exam) certification. Her plans after high school are to become a physician's assistant (PA).

"After high school, I plan to attend college to become a PA. I don't know exactly

what I want to specialize in yet, but I love kids, psychology, and even emergency medicine," Aeschilman said. "I'm passionate about medicine, and I know I'd love to go into that field."

Aeschilman was injured for much of this season, so she didn't put up the same cumulative numbers. Even still, she showed that her senior season might be one to look forward to with her impressive performance in so few games.

Aeschilman ended the season with a 3.27 ERA and two wins over 25.2 innings. She collected 22 strikeouts while giving up six walks, 12 earned runs, and two home runs. Opponents hit .266 against her with a .310 onbase percentage.

Each of Apopka's incoming senior pitchers said that, more important than their athletics, is their academics. Each one pointed to Coach MacWithey for instilling the importance of being a student before being an athlete.

With such an elite group of senior pitchers, Apopka is bound to be a problem for many batters in the state. Paired with Apopka's explosive offensive ability, the team's pitching staff could be the key to securing victories and a deep playoff run come spring next year.



# Serving up spiced tea, curried rice, and everything nice

From Charleston Receipts, we have Crab with Curried Rice, contributed by Mrs. Jack W. Simmons. Depending on your taste preferences,



be thoughtful as you adjust the level of spice. Some cooks like to add onions and garlic to their curried rice or even vegetables such as carrots, and peas, or bell pepper. For our younger or lessexperienced cooks who are not yet in the habit of cooking on autopilot, I have added directions for basic white sauce at the bottom.

We found Best Beets from Mrs. Henry Staats (Juliette Wiles) in Charleston Receipts. Besides being high in fiber and low in calories, beets are loaded with antioxidants and nutrients such as manganese and folate and are known to lower blood pressure. And, something we are all interested in, they even support your brain health!

Mrs. Ethel Brown shared her recipe for Apple Pudding with Stew-Pot Favorites of Zellwood, of which we are the very fortunate recipients, from Claire Ellington. Summer, or not, puddings are always on our menu.

If you watch any TV, especially dramas, you probably notice that, almost as commonplace as breathing air or drinking water, the characters imbibe a lot of alcoholic drinks. #### MRS. JACK SIMMONS' CRAB WITH **CURRIED RICE**

Recipe from Charleston Receipts, America's Oldest Junior League Cookbook in Print,

2 pounds crab meat 1 quart thick white sauce 1/2 cup finely cut bell pepper 1/2 cup chopped pimentos 1 cup finely cut celery

1-1/2 cups sharp cheese, coarsely

2 tablespoons Worcestershire 2 tablespoons sherry Paprika, salt and pepper

Season the sauce with salt, pepper, Worcestershire and sherry. Combine all ingredients or arrange in layers in casserole dish, keeping back 1/2 cup cheese for top of dish. Sprinkle paprika over top and bake for one hour in moderate oven (around 350-375 degrees Fahrenheit). Serves 8-10. Serve with rice curry, prepared as follows.

**BASIC WHITE SAUCE** 

Make a roux of: 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour 1/8 teaspoon salt Dash of white pepper

1 cup 2-percent milk In small saucepan, melt the butter and pepper and stir until smooth. Gradually whisk in the milk. If you add it too quickly, it will result in lumps. If you find you are getting lumps, stop adding milk and stir constantly until they smooth out. You may need to turn up the heat a little bit. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Cook and stir until thickened, a couple of minutes until bubbling thoroughly.

For a whole quart of white sauce, you will have to multiply the above measurements by four, resulting in: 8 tablespoons (1/2 cup) butter 8 tablespoons (1/2 cup) flour About 1/2 teaspoon salt Good shake of pepper

1 quart 2-percent milk

For extra thick white sauce, you will need to add a little more flour. Remember to *cook* the white sauce, don't just mix the flour and liquid together.

#### MRS. HENRY P. STAATS' **BEST BEETS**

Recipe from Charleston Receipts 2 cups fresh beets 3/4 tablespoon flour 1/2 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup apple cider vinegar 2 tablespoons butter

Cook whole beets until tender. If baby beets, leave whole, otherwise slice. Then cover with the following sauce: Mix flour with sugar and salt. Pour on vinegar and stir until dissolved. Let come to a boil, stirring constantly. Cook for 5 minutes and add butter. Pour sauce over beets and serve hot. Serves

#### MRS. ETHEL BROWN'S **APPLE PUDDING**

Recipe from Stew-Pot Favorites of Zellwood

1/4 cup butter 1 cup sugar 1 beaten egg 5 tart apples, finely chopped 1 cup sifted flour 1 teaspoon nutmeg 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1 teaspoon soda

Cream the butter and sugar. Add beaten egg and blend well. Sift flour, nutmeg, cinnamon, and soda together and add to butter and sugar mixture. Then add chopped apples. Mix all together. Bake in shallow pan at 350 degrees until done. Serve with lemon sauce.

**Lemon Sauce:** 3 tablespoons butter 3/4 cup sugar 2 tablespoons flour 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 1-1/2 tablespoons lemon juice and a little of the rind grated

Melt butter, add flour and stir until blended. Add other ingredients and allow to cook a few minutes over low heat. If too thick, add small amount of water. Serve over apple pudding.


