City launches new database to assist property owners

The city is preparing to launch a new economic development database this month, one that will display available commercial and industrial sites and buildings for sale or lease.

At the Wednesday, July 17, City Council meeting. Michelle Boylan, city economic development director, explained how the new database will assist property owners, developers, property management companies, realtors and bro-

The sites and buildings database will include centralized information, promotion of local assets, and

facilitation of site selection. The centralized information will feature available sites and buildings' specifications, zoning, infrastructure, and proximity to amenities.

The sites and buildings database is the result of one of Boylan's goals and initiatives for her department's growth.

"One of the items I discussed was an inventory of the assets that we have available, whether that is industrial or commercial land or buildings, and how we're going to get the information out there," Boylan said. "We are currently promoting that infor-

Former commissioner refutes mayor's quid pro quo allegations

Former City Commissioner Kyle Becker refuted allegations that Mayor Bryan Nelson previously made about the former Apopka official arranging a quid

pro quo with a city employee regarding the mayor's

At the July 17 City Council meeting, Becker, who moved to Winter Springs last spring, read his statement that was in response to the June 19 Apopka City Council, where Nelson asked the city commissioners to rescind a censure put on him. That censure was passed by a council majority on August 2, 2023, for lying about the employment status of previous city attorney Michael

"There was an outrageous accusation made of me by the mayor as documented and passed in the meeting minutes from the beginning of today's meeting," Becker said at the July 17 meeting.

Becker read a quote from Nelson's statement that the mayor made at the June 19 meeting, Nelson's statement incorrectly using the word "censorship" when the correct word should have been "cen-

"The censorship vote was brought forward by a former City Commissioner for political reasons and had nothing to do with public policy. Prior to the censorship vote, the prior City

Apopka man pleads guilty to trafficking firearms

26, United States Attorney Roger B. Handberg announced that Yessen Vasquez Tolentino, 37, of Apopka has pleaded guilty to one count of smuggling goods from the United States. Vasquez Tolentino faces a maximum penalty of 10 years in federal prison. A sentencing date has not yet been set.

According to the plea agreement, Vasquez Tolentino arranged for a freight forwarding company to pick up a refrigerator that he knew contained multiple firearms, firearms parts, and rounds of ammunition concealed inside the refrigerator's main door and freezer

door, and to ship the refrigerator to the Dominican Republic.

The defendant agreed to forfeit the 17 firearms, 33 firearms parts, and over 140 rounds of ammunition that were found inside the refrigerator.

This case was investigated by Homeland Security Investigations and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. It is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Diane Hu.

This case is part of Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN), a program bringing together all lev-

Sunshine State property owners face increased rates

A new report shows that insurance rates for property owners in the Sunshine State have increased exponentially over the past few years.

Florida TaxWatch released an in-depth analysis of Florida's property insurance market, examining underlying factors contributing to its instability and 42.5 percent rise since 2019. These include damages from hurricanes and litigation, which have put pressure on insurers and forced some to leave the state.

According to the report, Florida's property insurance market is fragile and reliant on state-run insurers as a backstop for homeowners who have no other options. Despite being a last-resort insurer, the Florida Citizens Property Insurance Company insures at least 17 percent of the state's property insurance market and is also the most expensive.

The report notes that the rising enrollment in Citizens is "alarming" because if funds are exhausted to pay claims, state law requires assessments to be levied, which can then be passed on to every policyholder, including private policyholders, homeowners, renters, automobile, and pet insurance.

According to a 2021 report from Florida TaxWatch, approximately 70 percent of Floridians live in coastal counties and

are at risk of chronic flood damage. The report points out that as sea levels rise, more properties are put at risk. This equates to around 64,000 homes, with an estimated value of \$26 billion, at risk of severe flooding.

Florida Tax Watch estimates that by 2100, over 1 million homes will be at risk and this increased risk will, in turn, increase property insurance rates even further. Unless the insurance market is stabilized, the high rates could push some residents to leave Florida.

Florida outdoes every other state in insurance costs, accounting for 10.8 percent of all premium costs in the U.S. According to the report, premiums vary between counties, ranging from \$1,824 in Sumter County to \$8,162 in Monroe County.

Since 2019, the Legislature has passed a series of reforms in an effort to combat insurance fraud and ease the burden on insurers. The report notes that legislative efforts are beginning to show promise. However, it also advises that lawmakers remain vigilant to prevent the market from spiraling and work to enhance resiliency.

Florida TaxWatch recommends that Florida limit its reliance on Citizens by depopulating the number of policies it holds and encouraging new private insurance companies to enter the state.

Schools notified of earned grades

It's that time of year again. School grades were released last week by the Florida Department of Education and I am very pleased with our local results.

The big news is that OCPS received an "A" grade from the state. The last time our district was an "A" was in 2019 and prior to that was 2010. Only twenty-two districts received this high mark out of the sixty-seven school districts in Florida.

This district grade is the direct result of the data driven decisions of Superintendent Maria Vazquez and the hard work of our Orange County School Board, District 7

teachers and staff. We are truly blessed to live in an area with such great local public schools.

The number of "A" schools in OCPS continues to rise with 88 traditional schools earning an "A" in 2023-24 compared to 77 last year. The percent

of schools earning an "A" or "B" grade this year increased to 69 percent, compared to 62 percent the year before. This is higher than the state average of 64 percent this year. No schools in OCPS received an "F" grade.

I'm so incredibly proud of not only our district and the direction it is headed, but of our local schools here in Apopka as well. We saw some big improvements that deserve a shout out.

First, I would like to congratulate both Wolf Lake Middle School and

mation through the Orlando Economic Partnership, which is the regional partner. But I think it's also important for us to advertise that ourselves and to put out there specifically Apopka sites, not just be blended in with the other communities that OEP represents."

The database would also highlight the Community Redevelopment Agency District, a 633-acre section located downtown that has a mix of residenc-

es, businesses and historic prop-

To gather information on the properties to feature on the database, Boylan collaborated with the city's media team to create a property solicitation form. The city also wants to do a social media campaign surrounding the database and advertise it on the city website, Boylan said.

City Commissioner Diane Velazquez praised Boylan for marketing the city's available properties to interested parties. "We discussed that, that when we're driving through the (state roads) 429 and the 451, a lot of our residents see the warehouses and for some they see it as we are losing all this green space," Velazquez said. "But for some of us, we look at it as progress. We look at it as revenue and businesses and jobs for Apopka. So, the best way is to realize what you are doing and, and I really thank you for marketing us, and that's a good thing."

City Commissioner Nick

Nesta pointed out that many agents, brokers, and developers may not be as proactive in submitting their property information to the city database. Therefore, he suggested, the city could cull information from the Orange County Property Appraiser to fill the database and later, agents, brokers, and developers interested in filling in their lease data may add to the information.

City Commissioner Nadia Anderson asked about potential liability with the city regarding the database's accuracy. City attorney Cliff Shepard said that the database needs to have appropriate disclaimers.

"That's what I thought. So, if we can add that disclaimer, I think that'll kind of alleviate potential lawsuits. But I think great job, and I'm looking forward to seeing it," Anderson replied.



Report indicates that Florida's growing population needs more physicians

(The Center Square) — A new report says many people in Florida don't receive needed health care because they lack easy access

to adequate services. Florida TaxWatch recently released its report, Social Determinants of Health: Health Care Access and Quality. According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, social determinants of health are environmental factors that can impact individuals' health outcomes.

These include health care access and quality; education access and quality; social and community context; neighborhood and built environment; and economic sta-

According to the report, these factors can majorly impact a person's health, wellbeing and quality of life. The report notes that 80 percent of a person's health is determined by social factors, ida ranked 41st in 2021 for

services, with the biggest barrier being the cost. In a 2019 survey of 1,200 Floridians, 55 percent had experienced health care cost burdens, while 78 percent worried they would not be able

> The report further notes that Florida has consistently ranked in the bottom 10 states for uninsured citizens.

Florida currently has a physician shortage and the report notes this plays a role in access to quality health

With Florida's popu-

lation growing, especially in rural areas, the number of physicians in the Sunshine State is insufficient. By 2030, an additional 22,000 physicians are needed to bridge the gap.

The report notes that as of 2023, only 40 percent of Florida's population has employer-sponsored health insurance, while the rate of uninsured Floridians was 11.2 percent in 2022 - higher than the national average Florida ranked 46th in the nation for the uninsured pop-

Compounding this are the 979,000 people who have been disenrolled from Medicaid, 460,000 of whom are children.

Furthermore, access depends on where the person lives. In rural areas, there are roughly 1.3 physicians for every 1,000 people available in the U.S., while urban areas have around 3.1 physicians for every 1,000 people.



Zellwood Elementary School on achieving an "A" grade this year. Both schools worked incredibly hard to bring their grades up to this level. This is the first time Wolf Lake Middle School has been an "A" school since 2010.

For Zellwood Elementary, this grade has not been achieved since 2004! More impressive is their rise from a "D" grade in 2016, consistently improving since that grade all the way to the top with an "A" this year.

Of course, these are not our only "A" schools in Apopka. Wolf Lake Elementary kept up its consistent "A" rating again this year and our newest school Kelly Park School received its second "A" grade since opening two years ago.

But "A" grades are not the only thing to celebrate. Lakeville Elementary went up from a "C" grade to a "B" grade this year. This is the first time Lakeville has been a "B" since 2015. I'm so proud of their hard work and dedication to improvement.

Another school worth mentioning is Apopka High School, which continues to improve. The school came in with a "B" again, continuing to improve since dropping to a "C" in 2022. In fact, they were

only 5 percentage points away from an "A"

Other close calls were Piedmont Lakes Middle School and Apopka Middle School. Both schools remained a "C", yet made significant gains and are very close to achieving their "B" grades. Piedmont Lakes was 4 percentage points away and Apopka Middle was only 1 percentage point away. I'm incredibly proud of the hard work by both these schools.

While I always love celebrating these results, I will always continue to profess that a single letter grade does not tell the whole story. Every single day in every one of our schools, there are amazing things happening.

Our schools help children make connections and learn despite the challenges many of our students come to school with each day. Each time I visit one of our local schools I am amazed at what I see. The creativity and passion of our educators and staff is truly miraculous.

As a school board member and a mom who has raised two children through our public schools, I am grateful. Grateful for those that go to work each day to educate our next generation so well.

Congratulations to all our schools on another year of hard work.

Mayor, the Commission- made a quid pro quo type of offer to a city employee is a complete fabrication and not supported by any ounce of evidence. Said differently, it's what normal individuals would call a lie," Becker said after quoting Nelson's statement. "I would like to call out and have you pay close attention to his words. He said the city employee has quoted, and again, quote, 'agreed to swear under oath or take a lie detector test to prove that the meeting actually happened.' End quote. What the mayor did not say was the employee would swear under oath or take a lie detector test to prove that the quid pro quo request that the mayor has accused me of saying.

"To that end, hold the cost of the lie detector test. As I freely admit, I had lunch with a few city employees at restaurants around my office in Maitland during my time of service, all within the limitations of our city charter. However, there was only one employee I had lunch with during the period leading up to the censure proceedings, and that cussed in city budget workwas Mr. Glen Brooks on July 19th, 2023. To claim as the mayor did that I was the one to ask the employee to the restaurant flies in the face of his 'Facts are a funny thing' mantra. The real fact is that Mr. Brooks texted me, to which I actually have evidence. I've got the text messages that I can provide and furnish to the clerk. On July 12th, 2023, at 2:13 p.m. with the following message: 'You available tomorrow or Friday for lunch? Question. I can come towards your work if that would be better.' End quote.

"The lunch itself was at Applebee's on Southhall Lane in Maitland, down from my office, and I would have a tough time believing that Mr. Brooks could or would (A) claim that I made that quid pro quo request the mayor is accusing me of saying, or (B) say that the primary intention for the meeting was anything other than discussing Mr. Brooks' funding priorities for water expenditures and the public services budget being dis-

shops the following week from that lunch.

"All said, this is yet another pathetic - and I say pathetic, bolded, period, underlined, capital anything that I can say is, it's a pathetic example of this mayor falsely disparaging my name in a public hearing with zero evidence to support this claim. This from a person who, at every turn, has the audacity to say I'm the one playing politics. Apopka, you deserve better – and I'm going to look right into the camera - you deserve better. You should demand better and more importantly, you should vote for better."

Becker wrapped up his four-minute speaking time by asking the mayor for evidence to back up his quid pro quo claims: "I want to see the evidence. I want you to name the employee that you said in your comments the last meeting that apparently said that I made these accusations because I had already filed to say that I was not running for reelection. And why didn't you bring it up during the over, almost a year ago? Thank you."

In 2023, Becker announced his decision to not run for re-election on the City Council.

Last April, he resigned as city commissioner of Seat 3 and vice mayor, citing the sale of his Apopka home and moving out of the city as the reason. As such, he missed what would have been his last City Council meeting on April 17.

Nadia Anderson was elected as Becker's successor in Seat 3 against rival Darryl Richardson in the March 19 City Council election. She and Nick Nesta, the Seat 4 incumbent who won his second term against challenger Eric Mock, took their oath of office on April 30.

On June 19, the City Council voted 3-2 to reimburse Nelson's attorney fees amounting to \$1,527.50 related to an ethics complaint filed against him, but regarding rescinding of the censure put on Nelson in 2023, the City Council allowed the vote to die on the floor.



The Florida Department of Education announced on Wednesday, July 24, the release of the 2023-24 School and District Grades. Overall, Orange County Public Schools earned an "A"

Our friend Susan Nethercote gave us a copy of her family memories named The Jones-Morris Family Treasury. Therein, we find Nancy Mahusay's recipe for Mrs. Olson's Sloppy Joe Mix.

We have Marvin Woods' Macaroni Salad recipe. This recipe makes 6 servings, enough for most family meals. He says, "Most macaroni is tube-shaped, but there are other forms including shells, twists, and ribbons. Elbows are, of course, the favorite. Beware, most macaroni doubles in size during cooking. This is one of the celebrated salads of the South. Whether it is an indoor or an outdoor function, you will usually see a few different versions of this salad. I also like to add flaked crabmeat or fresh tuna to this basic recipe. Other ingredients to think about using are ham, boiled eggs, sausage, and tomatoes."

Marvin says about his Marv Spice (Savory), "I use this spice mixture in my Macaroni and Cheese as well as in fish, chicken, and meat dishes that I feel can use a touch of inspiration." The recipe for Marv's spice is below.

Mrs. Harrison Smith shares a different slant on biscuits with her Crisp Cheese Biscuits. She leaves with us this caution: "Don't let them get too brown." We found this recipe in Plains 1 tablespoon butter Pot Pourri, shared with us by our friends in Plains, Georgia.

Let stand 10 minutes. 10) Measure pan drippings, including any chips. Add water to make 1 cup. 11) Heat to boiling and pass around with meat.
