The city of Apopka has an- soon thereafter. nounced the next steps in bringing a brand-new all-inclusive playground to the Northwest Recreation Com-

The existing playground was closed Monday, November 18, with construction of the new playground beginning late January 2025. The new parking areas and exit roadway are planned to begin construction

The all-inclusive playground project will include installation of new play structures, swings, slides, We-Go-Rounds, ZipKrooz, a children's play area, accessible pathways, a sensory garden, and additional enhancements, including new parking areas and a new exit roadway to Jason Dwelley Parkway.

The city of Apopka created the

project scope with support from Unlimited Capabilities and the Halliday Foundation, who have donated funding and expertise to develop an inclusive playground in which the Apopka community can take pride.

Unlimited Capabilities' mission is, "...to provide members of our community with special needs

Velazquez will replace Bill Arrowsmith, who had resigned from the seat. A former city commissioner and vice mayor, Arrowsmith was appointed to serve on the board of directors in 2018.Before that, he served on the board from 2012-2016.

An 18-year-old Apopka man died following a car collision into a utility pole on Rock Springs Road, Florida Highway Patrol reports.

On Monday, November 18, at approximately 10.21 p.m., the man was driving a 2014 Infiniti Q50 southbound on Rock Springs Road south of

Ponkan Road in the inside lane. For unknown reasons, he failed to maintain his lane, according to an FHP news release.

The driver over-corrected right and began to travel clockwise in a southwesterly direction across the southbound travel lanes and onto the

sidewalk. As a result, the left side of the Infiniti collided with a utility pole. This impact caused the Inifiniti to go back into the travel lanes.

We are thankful for new animal shelter

I was just briefed on the new Orange County Animal Shelter which is expected to open in late 2027. The project is at the 60-percent point in the design phase and we commissioners requested an update at this time frame.

The new animal shelter is projected to be 123,419 square feet in size, with 265 dog kennels (225 new kennels and 40 from the existing isolation/quarantine building), and housing for nearly 200 cats. The building will be on the same plot of land as the current facility, adjacent to the Mall at Millenia. Back in March of 2022, the Board of County Commissioners selected

Beacon Group, Inc. to design the new structure.

Why a new shelter? Orange County Animal Services (OCAS) is the only open-admission pet shelter in Orange County, meaning no stray domestic animal in need is turned away, regardless of any behavior or medical challenges. The health and wellbeing of these pets is of the utmost importance to Orange County.

The current shelter that houses these pets was built in 1987. At that point in time, the facility was considered state-of-the-art, featuring open air kennels for the primary dog building. The building has gone through a number of renovations over the past decade, aimed at improving the comfort of the shelter pets, but, to best meet current and future needs of the community's homeless animal population, a new shelter is needed, commissioners decided.

Operation conducted to improve pedestrian safety

Operation Best Foot Forward and the Apopka Police Department conducted a high-visibility crosswalk enforcement operation to promote pedestrian safety at West Lester Road and Devon Oak Parkway, where six crosswalk warnings were given, one crosswalk citation was given, one other warning was given, and one other citation was given. The speed limit at this crosswalk is 35 mph.

In honor of World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims on Sunday, November 17, the Best Foot Forward pedestrian safety program is conducting Operation Best Foot Forward, a two-week campaign across Central Florida that aims to reduce pedestrian injuries and deaths through awareness about Florida's driver yield laws, which provide pedestrians the right-of-way at cross-

brance recognizes the lives operation spans six Central lost and forever changed due to traffic collisions. From January through August 2024, FDOT District 5 reported 394 pedestrians and cyclists severely injured or killed, with nearly 20 percent of these victims aged 65 and over.

Over the past decade,

709 pedestrian and cyclist crashes occurred within one-quarter mile of crosswalks selected for evaluation by the Best Foot Forward program, informing the selection of enforcement locations during this operation.

Between November World Day of Remem- 12—22, this high-visibility Florida counties: Brevard, Marion, Orange, Osceola, Seminole, and Volusia. The initiative, aligned with FDOT's Target Zero campaign and MetroPlan Orlando's Vision Zero Action Plan, aims to reduce trafficrelated serious injuries and fatalities to zero.
